This will result in Zaidan and his mother Jina being required to stay at the hotel for another month. We could not provide this interim housing without the help of Raman Patel (Fairview Heights Rotary Club). Life in a hotel can be very boring -- if we could get just a few Rotarians to offer to take them out to a movie or the Zoo, Botanical Gardens, Science Center, or Aquarium to break up the time we would very much appreciate it. We are also grateful to the Ainad Temple Road Runners who have agreed to continue to provide transportation for Zaidan for his therapy sessions and clinic appointments.

Isabella (BELLA) T. Now that Bella has moved to physical therapy once per week she will transfer to her prior host family Cheryl and Kevin Settle (Mt. Vernon Rotary Club). Cheryl and Kevin will make the weekly trip to Shriners Children's Hospital St. Louis. If any Mt. Vernon Rotarians have time, please reach out to the Settles to offer any help in hosting or transporting Bella.

Brandon C. will arrive in mid July for additional treatment for his multiple osteochondromas. Thank you to Roberta and Paul Lynch (Mt. Vernon Rotary Club) for hosting him during his treatment with the support of Doug and Deborah Kroeschen.

Jason C. Although he started as a BCP applicant in the 2022 screening clinic, Jason's care was not available through Shriners Children's Hospital. With the close relationships built with other care providers, we received information that our care partner, World Pediatrics - St. Louis, in collaboration with BCP, has secured surgery and treatment for Jason at Cardinal Glennon Hospital. We take very seriously the belief that, "It takes a village."

Anticipating approval from Shriners Children's Hospital International of submitted applications for Jazua M (Scoliosis) and Adrian C. (Osteochondromas), we will need host families for these two patients. Eight additional applications from our 2024 screening clinics will arrive this week for processing to SCH International. When approved, several of these children will need host families. We are again asking each Rotarian to consider opening their home and hearts to help, and to also help spread the word to their families, friends, circles of influence, and churches that we will need host families for many of these applicants. The Rotary Club of Swansea hosted their 21st Annual "Service Above Self" 5K Run/Walk on Saturday, June 1, 2024, which began and ended at Wolf Branch Elementary School.

Despite the light rain, more than 120 participants helped to support the Chad Wood Memorial Scholarship Fund which benefits college scholarship programs for qualifying graduates of area high schools.

"This event is important to our club members because it honors Chad's memory, who was an amazing young man taken from our community too soon," said event organizer and Swansea Rotarian Charlie Pitts. "I appreciate all of our volunteers and participants who came out and helped us make this event a success."

The news of Chad Wood's sudden and unexpected death on Monday morning, May 9, 2005, took the breath away from all of our members. Ray Wood was the Charter President when the Rotary Club of Swansea was formed in 2002. He and his wife, Penny, had been a wonderful friend and supporter of the club. Chad was a fine student, a superb athlete who starred on the Belleville East Lancers football and baseball teams and, most important, was a devoted and loving son to his parents and a wonderful brother to his three siblings: Jennifer, Gretchen and Robert.

At its meeting on May 12, 2005, the Board of Directors of the Rotary Club of Swansea unanimously voted to donate \$1,000 to the Belleville East High School Athletic Department in Chad's memory and approved a motion to designate our scholarship program, funded by the 5K Run each June, as the Chad Wood Memorial Scholarship Fund. The 2024 recipients of the Chad Wood Memorial Scholarship include three Belleville East High School students: Hannah Webb, Madelyn Koch, and Ashley Tyler.

"We are proud to support outstanding students in Swansea, including those who are pursuing college through this scholarship, as well as CAVE students who are pursuing the trade industry through our annual CAVE raffle in the fall," said Club President Ed Henrichs. "Thank you to all of our wonderful event sponsors, as featured on the back of our 5K shirts, for supporting this important program."

Transforming Lives In Malawi



For more than 20 years District 6510's Rotarians have provided clean water, education, food and other assistance in northern Malawi. Our partners and donors have included District 6510's Clubs and The Rotary Foundation. We estimate more than 20,000 lives have been transformed by our efforts.

WHY MALAWI?

Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world, ranked 174 of 189 countries on the Human Development Index. World Bank estimates 72 percent live in poverty, with more than 20 percent living in extreme poverty. As 90 percent of its' residents are engaged in subsistence farming, the economy is extremely vulnerable to weather and natural disasters. Most live on incomes of less than \$2.15 USD per day.

Our team's focus this past year was addressing significant food insecurity and providing clean water to an estimated 7,000 people. This month's focus is our efforts to alleviate food insecurity, especially during the 3 ½ months leading up to the April harvest as families deplete their food.

MITIGATING THE IMPACTS OF FOOD INSECURITY

A combination of skyrocketing fertilizer prices (+150%), multiple large currency devaluations (-58%), exacerbated by severe drought and storms during the growing season, have resulted in very low crop yields. This resulted in high levels of food insecurity during the past two years. The IPC estimated "nearly 50 percent of the population necessitated intervention to mitigate disaster risks thru March 2024".

- PROVIDED 130,000 MEALS TO PRIMARY SCHOOL STUDENTS
 - 2,200 students during January-April 2024
- PROVIDED FERTILIZER SUBSIDIES TO FAMILIES

Preliminary Estimate: Improved yields by 40-50%

FOOD INSECURITY WILL INCREASE DURING 2025

In March 2024 Malawi declared a state of disaster over drought. Publications reported "... the country entered the dry season with very low food stocks... Malawi is heading to a food crisis later this year." Our intelligence supports this.

TEAM'S 2024-25 PRIORITIES:

- Increase the number of schools and students receiving meals
- Increase number of families receiving fertilizer subsidies
