During her tenure at the City of Fishers, Baumgartner has led the city's business retention, expansion and attraction project efforts while serving as the main point of contact between Fishers businesses and the City. Since 2015, Baumgartner has been part of the team responsible for attracting 25 new companies to Fishers, resulting in \$500 million in capital investment and 4,900 new highwage jobs. Baumgartner led the city's efforts to become a Duke Energy Site Readiness Program city in 2018.

Baumgartner holds a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and Spanish from Purdue University and lives in Fishers with her husband and two children.

I look forward to visiting your club as we work to Create Hope in the World together.



WHO'S AFRAID OF A GLOBAL GRANT?

It may seem surprising, but many Rotarians are afraid to propose a Global Grant to their Rotary Club.

One seasoned Rotarian summed it up this way. "Global Grants can be a bit intimidating, even for those of us that have been doing this for a long time. If I have a choice, I'd always rather support someone else's than try to do my own!" Some say it probably requires a high tolerance for bureaucracy.

So, what's this beast that makes many shy away?

- First, they are large grants in the range of \$30,000 to \$400,000 in cost. Second, they should be completed in one year.

 Third, they find a joint project between a Host Club and International Club. Finally, they must be approved by The Rotary Foundation (TRF).



Global Grants fund large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's 7 areas of focus: peacebuilding and conflict prevention; disease prevention and treatment; water, sanitation, and hygiene; maternal and child health; basic education and literacy; community economic development; and the environment. Global grants can fund humanitarian service activities, scholarships for graduate-level academic studies, and vocational training teams (groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about a particular field or to learn more about their own).

In summary, Global Grants are big impact projects. They are what Rotary is known for in the world and what Rotarians continue to do in the world.

Next month, we will start demystifying the Global Grant process.
