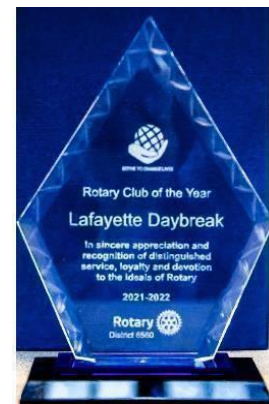

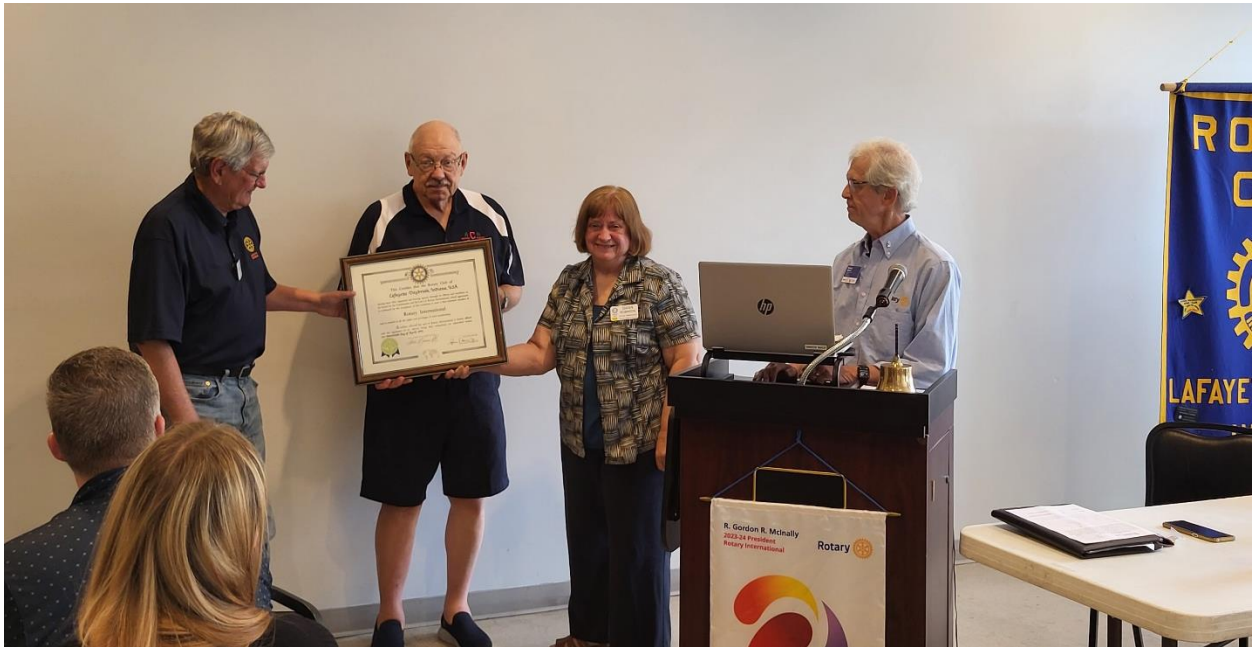

Program:

Our program today was given by Ken Clark, who has been the Director of Development for Trinity Life Ministry since 2019. He explained that this used to be called Trinity Mission and was established in 1985. Their focus was originally on homelessness, but they have realized that addiction is often a large reason for this and now work to help men with both problems. He noted that their mission was to be a Faith-based, Christ centered Redemptive Community. Their program is a 12-month residential program with Phase I being Relationship and lasts 3 months, Phase II is Transformation, again lasting 3 months and then a 6 month Multiplication Phase III. During Phase II they work ½ days and work a 40-hour week in Phase III. They also have a Mentor Ministry helping these men learn how to live by Biblical teachings.



Their program was initially in Lafayette but in 2005 they moved to a 100+ year old home in Crawfordsville. In 2016 they added a ministry to the families of their residents after noting that families were often the only support and could be supported themselves. This helps the families understand the men that return from the program, often changed dramatically. They serve 80-90 men each year in a 43 bed facility. They unfortunately have to turn away over 1,000 men annually. They provide 15,695 nights of lodging annually, 47,085 meals and the program costs about \$18-20K each year. One of their services

is to help the men get the papers they need to become employable. They also help them get HIP insurance to provide for dental care as well as often having to get treatment for Hepatitis C.

They get 60% of their funding from individuals, churches and businesses, 30% from their Thrift store and 10% from grants. They do not accept insurance or get any state or federal monies. They have a fund-raiser scheduled at Loeb Stadium with the Aviators on July 11th.

He concluded by saying we can help with prayer, providing welcome baskets (which include pillows, sheets and toiletries), backpacks for men to store their papers and providing time, money and meals and using their Thrift store.
