 - Ray Kramp, Past District Governor 2021-2022 visited our meeting to present Rob Caird , Club Past President with Certificate of Recognition for our club's contributions to the Foundation General Fund and Polio Plus. Ray shared that the Pandemic drastically reduced Foundation donations, but our club prevailed and made our goals. Our contribution to the Polio Plus Fund were doubly matched by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Rotary International, in totality, donated \$50 million and the Gates Foundation donated \$100 million to eradicate polio (see story on the Foundation below). We had the pleasure of hearing from 3 of our newest members and one tenured member, who just keeps hanging around.

- Our first member to share their background, family and personal interests was **Sarah McKee**. Sarah is married with 3 children, the oldest 22 years old. Sarah started out her career in insurance, working with Jerry Rogers (God Bless her). She liked working with people and finance and is now a Loan Officer at Union Savings & Loan Association. Sarah was awarded Best Mortgage Loan Officer in 2021 by the Daily Reporter. Sarah enjoys the outdoors and loves to kayak. Sarah has volunteered to co-chair this year's Steak N' Bake N' Raffle with Jake Kersey. She also is a regular at our Rotary Soup Kitchen Volunteer Program, as well as working the Fill A Truck - Fill A Pantry food drive.
- Our second member to share was **Dr. Lori Deemer**, a family physician. Lori is originally from Northwest Indiana. Lori received her medical degree from Indiana University. She moved to Greenfield to accept a position with Hancock Health. Her expertise is in obesity and Women's Health and has over 21 years of experience. She is the Director of Hancock Wellness Center. She is board certified and a Castle Connolly Top Doctor and has been featured in Indianapolis Monthly. She has been recognized as an "Exceptional Woman in Medicine" in 2020, 2021 and 2022. Lori is the mom of a blended family of six. She enjoys playing soccer with her daughters, cross-fit, cycling and cooking.
- Our third member to share with us was **Nelson Smiley**. Nelson is a Purdue Graduate, where he received his degree in Construction Management. Nelson is originally from Williamsport, Indiana. He is a father of five and now has a blended family of six. He started his career in Construction, which took him to Boston and Detroit. As his children grew, he decided to return to Indiana and settled in Greenfield. He professes to being a bit shy, despite the fact that he is very well spoken. The Twenty-Fourth Annual Gift of Life Auction

 The Rotary Club of Greenfield is at work preparing for their 24th Annual Gift of Life (GOL) Auction which will be held on April 22, 2023, at the Community Life Center on East Washington Street. Proceeds from the GOL Auction help fund medical missions to under-developed countries for children with life threatening heart conditions. These medical missions also serve as training for local doctors and nurses, so they can conduct these sophisticated surgeries on children. We often take the proceeds and request matching grants from the District, Rotary International and other outside organizations. One year our profits of \$60,000 were transformed into \$180,000 with the help of matching grants. There are times, however, when medical facilities in an underdeveloped area cannot accommodate these heart surgeries. In those situations, we will help fund travel for a child to Riley's Children Hospital and the Ronald McDonald House. Over the years our club has helped raise over \$1,000,000 for the Gift of Life Program. This project and fundraiser has come to define our club and has become a part of our legacy. We cannot pull this project off without the full support of every member of our club, our family, and friends. We are accepting donated gifts for the auction. This event is open to the public and tickets can be purchased by contacting our co-chairperson, Chantel Fowler at 317-462-2404 or stopping by Miller's Jewelry and speaking with co-chairperson, Sherry Haines.

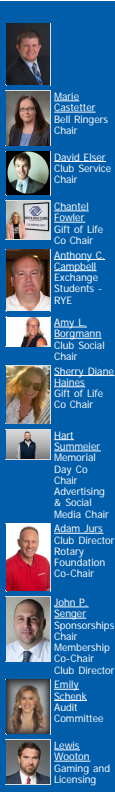

Our club has 5 Major Donors, which is a rare and a special distinction among Rotarians.

Nominations for District Governor

What a privilege and responsibility for the Rotarians of our district to nominate candidates for the office of Governor three years in advance. According to our by-laws, any Rotarian can nominate a District Governor candidate.

Per the RI By-Laws section 16.010 Qualifications of a Governor-nominee are:

Unless specifically excused by the board, no person shall be selected as nominee for governor unless the Rotarian has the following qualifications at the time of selection.

- 16.010(a) Rotarian in Good Standing.
 - Rotarian must be a member in good standing of a functioning club in the district.
- 16.010(b) Rotarian's Qualifications as Past Club President.
 - The Rotarian must have served as club president for a full term or as charter president for at least six months.
- 16.010(c) Rotarian's Ability to Fulfill Duties of Governor.
 - The Rotarian must demonstrate willingness, commitment, and ability, physically and otherwise, to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of the office of governor as provided in section 16.030.
- 16.010(d) Rotarian's Knowledge of Qualification.
 - The Rotarian must demonstrate knowledge of the qualifications, duties, and responsibilities of governor as prescribed in the bylaws.
- 16.010(e) Rotarian's Certification of Qualifications.
 - The Rotarian must submit to RI, through its general secretary, a signed statement that the Rotarian understands those qualifications, duties, and responsibilities. Such statement shall also confirm that the Rotarian is qualified for the office of governor and willing and able to assume and faithfully perform those duties and responsibilities.



In addition to the above, section 16.020 requires a governor, when taking office, must have attended the international assembly's full duration, have been a Rotarian for at least seven years, and continue possessing the qualifications in section 16.010.

It is also suggested that the candidate be well versed in the operations of the District, perhaps having served on one or more District Committees or served as an Assistant District Governor.

According to the by-laws of District 6560, a Nominating Committee has been formed for the purpose of choosing from candidates. This year, the candidates are being considered to serve as Governor for the 2025-2026 Rotary Year. The process involves opening the call for nominations at least 30 days before the Committee meets to conduct interviews to select the District Governor (Nominee Designate).
