Michael Shermis introduced our speaker, Bloomington Animal Care and Control Director Virgil Sauder.

Virgil, who has worked in animal welfare for the last 23 years, started as Shelter Manager for the City of Bloomington in 2005 and became Director in 2015.

Over the years, Virgil has worked with staff and volunteers to move the agency to align with best practices in the field, dramatically decreasing euthanasia rates and moving the Animal Shelter to a successful adoption agency.

Animal Care and Control addresses and responds to animal needs through education, enforcement and support and strives to build a community where animals are valued and treated with kindness and respect.

In addition to making animals available for adoption, the shelter also provides post-adoptive support.

"Shelter volunteers and foster families are the backbone of our organization," Virgil says.

To help the organization accomplish its mission, Virgil asks citizens to spread the message of the importance of spaying and neutering animals, especially dogs, cats and rabbits; microchip their pets for easy identification; and consider adopting an animal.

Located at 3410 S. Walnut St., the Shelter houses an average of 3,400 animals per year, mostly dogs and cats, with from 180 to 350 at any given time. It's also taken in snakes, rats and birds. Most unusual "guest"? A caiman (an alligator relative).

In spite of its efforts to save animals, the Animal Care and Control Center must still euthanize a small number, about 7 percent. "Some animals are injured so badly that they can't be rehabilitated," Virgil says.
