This week's program: Award-winning cartoonist salutes comics



When U.S. Rep. John Lewis visited the IU Auditorium in 2015 to discuss his award-winning autobiography, *March*, he was accompanied by co-author Andrew Aydein and award-winning graphic artist/cartoonist Nate Powell.

Nate, who began self-publishing comics as an Arkansas teenager in 1992, had just illustrated the book, and the congressman and his collaborators were there to talk about it. The event coincided with the 50th anniversary of the Selma-to-Montgomery march that Lewis co-led, changing our country's history.

Nate estimates he created 300 real-life historical figures for the *March* trilogy.

The scene where Lewis meets Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. for the first time was the first page that Nate drew for *March*. While he found approaching that page most difficult, he says it made subsequent depictions of real-life people easier.

On April 29, Nate spoke at Bloomington Rotary after receiving an invitation from **Sally Gaskill**, who co-chaired the 2015 event.

While Nate has gained fame through other graphic books, including his adaptation of James Loewen's *Lies My Teacher Told Me*, he says he is still best known for his work with Lewis.

The 2015 IU Auditorium crowd is Nate's second largest audience of all time.

"I make a lot of books, and I work seven days a week," says Nate, who has called Bloomington home for 21 years. "There isn't a lot of money in comics. You have to love what you do."

During a 15-minute Q&A, Nate addressed Rotarians' questions. Among other things, he said:

- It was difficult initially to find a publisher to accept his work.
- He does an equal number of fiction and nonfiction books.
- Cartoonists are often the first to be let go at newspapers.
- Japanese (especially), European, and Brazilian audiences are much quicker to accept cartoons than are Americas.
- He occasionally hears from Nazis, white supremacists, and fascists.

"I avoid taking the bait," Nate says. "I abide by the rule that you can't win a debate with a fascist."

# **April 29 Celebration of Service**

**Thought for the Day: Alain Barker,** born and reared in South Africa, called on Rotarians to live out our values through the 4-Way Test, opening ourselves to the deeper humanity of all around us and connecting to those we don't understand.

In 1990, a year after he became president, South Africa's F.W. de Klerk took the courageous step to once and for all let go of the past by releasing Nelson Mandela from prison. This led to the abolition of apartheid and a path that would lead to the country's first democratic election.

"We can play our part in a world where the name of freedom and democracy can be kept alive," Alain said.

**Cindy Brumbarger** reflected on the amazing cycling success of David Brailsford, director for British Cycling and general manager of cycling's

Team Sky. When Sir David became head of British Cycling in 2002, the team had almost no record of success in its 76-year history. Under Sir David's leadership, that quickly changed. At the 2008 Beijing Olympics, his squad won seven out of 10 gold medals available in track cycling, an achievement they matched at the London Olympics four years later. Sir David now leads Britain's first ever professional cycling team, which has won three of the last four Tour de France events.

His secret? Sir David applied a theory of marginal gains to cycling. He gambled that if the team broke down what goes into competing on a bike and then improved each element by just one percent, it would achieve a significant aggregated increase in performance.

If we, like Sir David, change little bitty things over time, we, too, can have a true impact, Cindy said.
