



Montgomery County Board of Elections, Board Member



The Montgomery County Board of Elections commitment to a safe, accurate, fair and efficient election process guides every aspect of the voting process. Bi-partisan by Ohio law from the Board to the Polling Election Officials, the Board oversees everything elections from security and IT, customer service, logistics, training, and technical writing to developing day-of contingency "out of the parking lot†voting plans if an emergency prevents the opening of the polling location. The Board of Elections operates year-round and has 28 full-time employees, 45 seasonal employees, and up to 1,700 election day employees for a November presidential election.



The Montgomery County elections are subject to local, state, and national election laws, including the Ohio Election Officials manual and Ohio Revised Code. Montgomery County has 370,000 registered voters and operates 382 precincts in 483 voting locations. There can be between 35–200 candidates and between 10–50 issues at any given election and the Board oversees spring Primary elections, special elections (typically in August) and General elections in November.

Every ballot, voted or unvoted, is tracked and accounted for through a backup system that is triple-checked from encrypted memory sticks to the submit DS-200 scanners to the paper ballots that are stored separately in locked and sealed bins that are delivered directly to the Board of Elections by Polling Election Officials (a democrat and republican) at the close of the polls. The memory sticks from the scanners are zeroed out and are delivered independently of the paper ballots in a compartment with a recorded seal.

No part of the election records, including registered voter information or ballots, is ever online or connected to another device by wire or wirelessly. The system is tested by "white hat†hackers for vulnerabilities and the day of "war room†is opened by 5:30 AM and is fully staffed with hot line access for voters and polling location officials and rovers who respond directly to locations for equipment troubleshooting and onsite assistance. You can be assured that elections in Montgomery County are non-partisan, impartial, totally transparent, fully tracked and staffed by staff who are guided by Ohio Ethics law and faithful to their mission to deliver a safe, accurate, fair, and efficient election.
