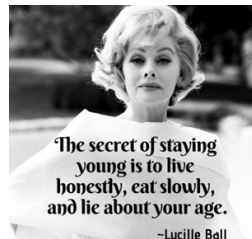

world. Everything we think, do, or say contributes to the Rotary International mission of Service Above Self through fellowship and shared purpose.

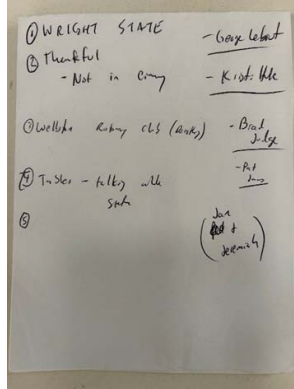

The Dayton Region's Hub for new venture creation, social innovation, and entrepreneurship education, the Hub was created for IMPACT: a space to transform the urban core, create new businesses, and attract and retain talent; ACCESS: a space with abundant educational, intellectual, technical, and capital resources and ENERGY: to provide a space for passionate innovators to launch, learn, and lead. A major feature of The Hub Powered by PNC Bank is the L. William Crotty Center, started 25 years ago by Brother Ray Fitz. A part of the University of Dayton School of Business Administration, the Center is a place where students put theory into practice by starting microbusinesses with the support of successful entrepreneurs.

What's the future for the Arcade and The Hub Powered by PNC Bank? The over 4,000 square feet will be developed into commercial spaces, first-floor retail spaces, classroom spaces and spaces for 180 member companies and co-working spaces are available right now! Entrepreneurs can rent a desk seat for \$150 a month, for \$250 a desk and filing cabinet, and for \$500, a small private office.
