PROGRAM:

Sela York, TSgt, Air National Guard
TSgt Sela R. York serves as a 124th All-Source Intelligence Analyst. In this position, she leads her flight of Air National Guard members in providing all source intelligence to mission partners and the intelligence community. She oversees training, mission development and intelligence production.

TSgt York enlisted into the Air Force her senior year of high school. She graduated from Operations Intelligence technical school in 2014.

Her first permanent station was Moody Air Force Base where she served as an Operations Intelligence Analyst before deploying to Southwest Asia in support of Operations Inherent Resolve, Enduring Freedom and Spartan Shield where she trained various deployed units on force protection intelligence operations and counter-small unmanned aerial systems.

TSgt York returned to Moody AFB and became a part of the Force Protection Intelligence Training team for the 8-20th Base Defense Group. TSgt York trained Intelligence professionals and Security Forces airmen on applying intelligence into Force Protection and Integrated Defense.

After serving in Active Duty for five years, she entered into the Ohio Air National Guard as an Operations Intelligence Analyst. Prior to assuming her current position, she was the Military Exercise Operations Section Chief at in the 126th Intelligence Squadron.

Sela talked about the history of the Ohio Air National Guard. She identified that it was created by the Federal Government's Militia Act of 1792.

There are four wings of the ANG in Ohio:

- 121st focuses on refueling planes that are in flight.
- 178th focuses Surveillance and Reconnaissance (this is the one Sela is in)
- 180th is the Fighter Wing
- 179th is the Cyberspace wing. This one is brand new!!

Benefits of serving in the ANG include education, medical, travel and the ability to serve your state and country, among many other benefits.



Quick History

- Creation of National Guard: Federal government passed the Militia Act of 1792
- U.S. Constitution recognizing that "a well-regulated militia being necessary for the security of a free state,"
- Authorized the Governor of each state to appoint an Adjutant General (TAG)
 - TAG oversees unit training and organization
- National guard units are placed under the control of the Governor rather than the federal government
- Creation of Air Component: WWII post-war politics
 - Initially, the Air Force did not want the ANG
 - Air Guard created to fill the gaps of a much smaller Active Duty force
 - ANG Birthday September 18, 1947

OHANG's Future

- 179th Airlift Wing selected to be the nation's first Air National Guard cyberspace wing
- Primary mission for ~50 years was military cargo airlift (C-130s)
- 179th CW will provide cyber-enabled capabilities supporting tactical needs in air superiority and information warfare
 - Provides a competitive advantage in combat performance and survivability in joint force operations
- Will reach Initial Operating Capability (IOC) in 2025 and Full Operational Capability (FOC) in 2027

ANCIENT HISTORY

You probably know that St. Patrick's Day is named after a Christian Saint. But, did you know that St. Patrick was born in Roman Britain in the 4th century A.D.?

When St. Patrick was 16, he was kidnapped by pirates and taken to Ireland as a slave for a druid (pagan) priest. This experience deepened his faith in Christianity and convinced him it was his God-given mission to convert Ireland to Christianity.

St. Patrick escaped from Ireland and went to France where he became a priest. When he became an ordained bishop in 432 A.D., he was sent by the Pope to Ireland to spread the word of God.

St. Patrick is attributed with introducing different Irish iconography, such as the Celtic cross, a hybrid pagan/Christian symbol; the three-leaf shamrock, a symbol of the holy trinity; and driving snakes from Ireland.
