Despite having only been Members in our Club for less than two years, these Rotarians have gone above and beyond in answering the call for our recently rebooted Youth Exchange Program.

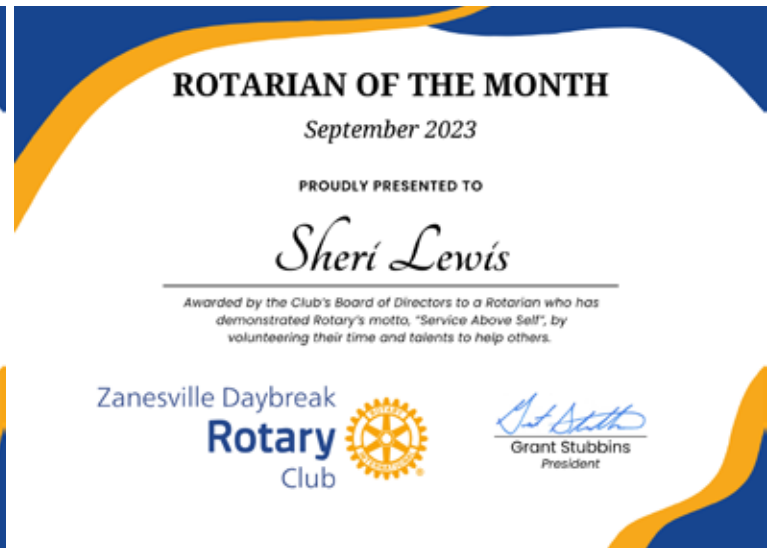
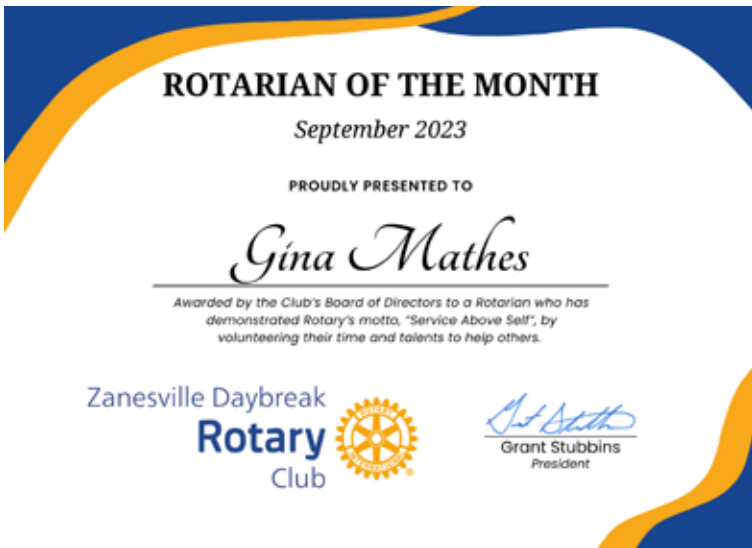
Sheri Lewis and Gina Mathis have been instrumental in helping our Club meet our hosting obligations.

ANCIENT HISTORY “FACT OF THE DAY”:

Grant shared the start of football season made him think about the origins of not only American football, but also ball sports in general. Did you know ball sports are believed to have originated in Mesoamerica around 2500 BC with the invention of the Mayan sport of pitz. For those of you who have been to Can-



cun, Mexico on vacation, you may have taken a day trip to the Mayan city of Chichen Itza (500-1400 AD), which contains a ball court. The ball would have been made from liquid latex extracted from rubber trees which was turned into resin and molded into a ball that weighed between 6-11 pounds. Today's modern footballs are made from a rubber bladder encased in leather and weigh a little less than 0.9 pounds.

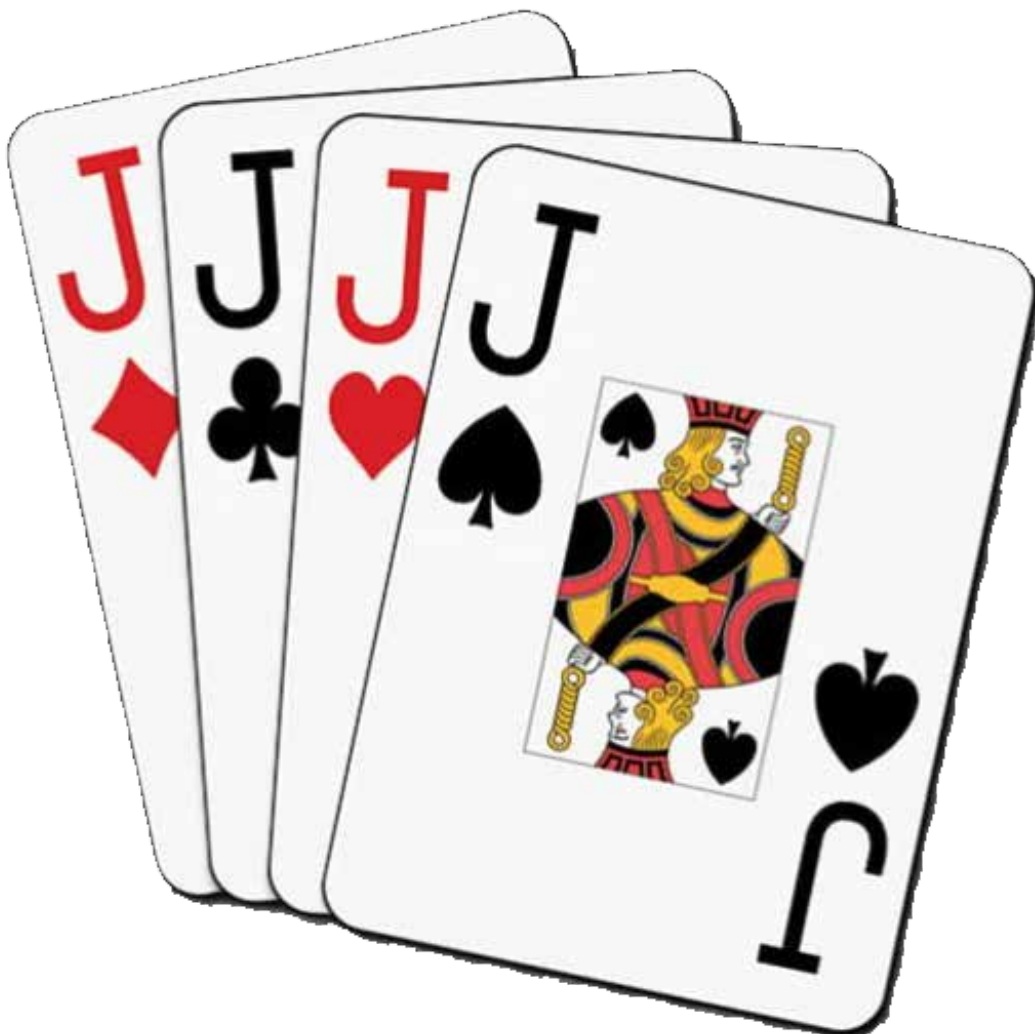
