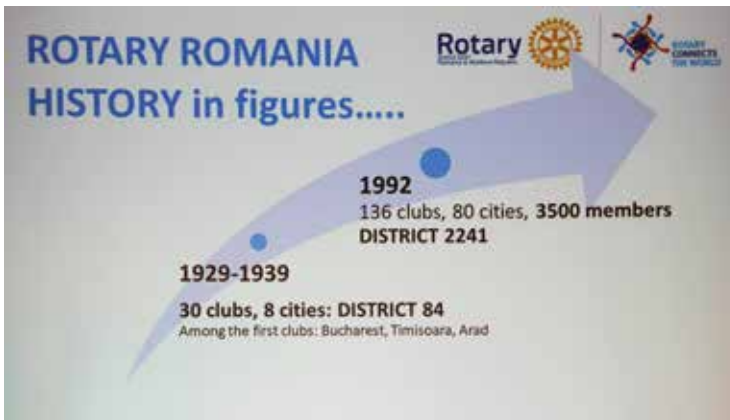

PROGRAM

Dana Matz introduced our five New Generation Service Exchange guests from Romania. The leader of the group was Sorina Bradea, a hydraulic engineer that runs her own Human Resources Agency. Romania is about 16 hours of travel time from our location. It is located in the eastern part of Europe. Their flag is red, yellow and blue, which represents blood, grain and the many rivers that flow throughout the country. She spoke a little about the history of Rotary in Romania.





There were about 30 Rotary Clubs from 1929 to 1939, when the government decided they were too connected and did away with all Rotary clubs until 1992. The growth of new clubs has been very good. There are now 136 clubs in 80 cities with 3500 members.

She described some of the projects that the Rotary Clubs of Romania was working on: they have planted 250,000 trees with a goal of 1,000,000 trees, they have a very active Smile Program where they perform all types of dental work, they give books to children and also read the books to them, and they do Rotary Mentoring for new Rotarians. They brought with them some very talented individuals. They had a math professor, advertising specialist (who is also a self-pronounced coffaholic), history teacher, and a marketing and psychology major. Emilia Bra-dea, Sorina's daughter, who works with her in their Human Resource Agency believes you need to know your own strengths and weaknesses in order to understand the same about others.

It seems their main tour guide was Del Dunlap. They visited 5 B's, Mission Oaks, Zanesville High School, Zane State College, Ohio University and Alan Cottrill Sculpture Studio to name a few.

They gave Del a Rotary Pin from their club for his hospitality during their stay. They presented President Ed with their Rotary Flag and also

gave him a pin from their Rotary Club. President Ed gave each member of the group a box of chocolates for Tom's Ice Cream Bowl and a Y Bridge Rotary Pin along with the normal speaker's gifts.

1. The first fold of our flag is a symbol of life.
2. The second fold signifies our belief in eternal life.
3. The third fold is made in honor and tribute of the veteran departing our ranks, and who gave a portion of his or her life for the defense of our country to attain peace.
4. The fourth fold exemplifies our weaker nature as citizens trusting in God; it is to Him we turn for His divine guidance.
5. The fifth fold is an acknowledgment to our country, for in the words of Stephen Decatur, "Our country, in dealing with other countries, may she always be right, but it is still our country, right or wrong."
6. The sixth fold is for where our hearts lie. It is with our heart that we pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.
7. The seventh fold is a tribute to our armed forces, for it is through the armed forces that we protect our country and our flag against all enemies.
8. The eighth fold is a tribute to the one who entered into the valley of the shadow of death, that we might see the light of day, and to honor our mother, for whom it flies on Mother's Day.
9. The ninth fold is an honor to womanhood, for it has been through their faith, love, loyalty, and devotion that the character of the men and women who have made this country great have been molded.
10. The 10th fold is a tribute to father, for he, too, has given his sons and daughters for the defense of our country since he or she was first-born.
11. The 11th fold, in the eyes of Hebrew citizens, represents the lower portion of the seal of King David and King Solomon and glorifies, in their eyes, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.
12. The 12th fold, in the eyes of a Christian citizen, represents an emblem of eternity and glorifies, in their eyes, God the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost.
13. The last fold, when the flag is completely folded, the stars are uppermost, reminding us of our national motto, "In God We Trust."
