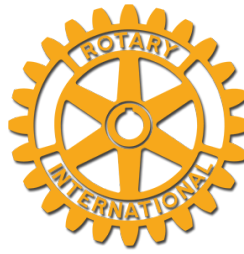

I'm writing this on Thursday, December 29th, just two days away from New Year's eve. Alice and I have friends coming to visit and party hats to wear as we welcome in 2023. We are really excited. But, honestly - what I'm really looking forward to on Saturday is football - lots of football! Starting with Michigan vs. TCU at 4 PM, I will be sitting on the couch, beer in hand with my buddies, ready for kick-off. And, to be honest, I'll probably have spent a few hours ahead of time watching all the pregame coverage. After the first game, things will get really exciting when Ohio State plays Georgia. By then, we'll have enjoyed some new year's eve snacks like fancy cheese and crackers mixed in with some tail-gating necessities such as wings and nachos. I can't wait - "O-H!"

I realize it's possible that you aren't as big of a football fan as I am. Perhaps you have another sport that gets you fired up. Our world offers many excellent opportunities for extreme fanaticism - March Madness, World Series, World Cup, Frozen Four, etc. Whatever it is, I'm sure you can relate to how exciting it is to connect with others and watch great teamwork at its highest level.

Speaking of teams, I know we all share a fanaticism for our Rotary team! So, let's use this opportunity to take lessons from one of my favorite things - football - and put those lessons into action with another of my favorite things - Rotary!

The questions I'm asking are: "What characteristics of a winning team should Rotary clubs in District 6690 emulate from football?" And, "How can watching football make us better Rotarians?"

Here are a few characteristics of high performance football teams that stand out to me and are rationale for Rotarians to watch more football:

1. Goals: High-performing football teams have clear, shared goals. Members of the team agree collectively on what the team is trying to accomplish. They are committed to working hard because they have all been part of setting team goals and priorities. We do the same thing in our Rotary clubs by gaining consensus on club goals and keeping our eyes on the ball, focusing on the most important issues in the club and not being distracted by small ones.

2. Roles: Every football player on a team has an important role to play. A team full of quarterbacks won't be as successful as one with kickers, linebackers, coaches and trainers. Each member of your Rotary club brings unique gifts. As they find positions they are best suited for, your club becomes more successful. We have strong and enthusiastic members who go into our communities and rake leaves for seniors in our communities or build a park for all of our residents to share. We also have members who contribute their treasure to The Rotary Foundation to fuel our "Rotary bus." We have members who are willing to take on club leadership roles. All are important and need to be nurtured.

3. Shared vision: One way that coaches help their football teams work effectively together is by creating a shared sense of what is ahead, what the challenges may be and preparing for these challenges. If you haven't gone through a club visioning process recently, let me know and our District leadership will help.

4. Trust in the team and cooperation of the members: Each member of a successful football team recognizes that the power of the team as a whole is greater than the individual strengths of athletes. While this is an obvious ingredient to team success, it is also a very difficult one to cultivate. Good coaches stress trust and cultivate cooperation throughout the season. In Rotary, trust increases when members reflect on the activities they do at every meeting. Do our meetings intentionally build a sense of belonging and collaboration? Should we consider planning events designed to build a solid foundation of trust? Perhaps we should plan a club assembly during a regular meeting that could include relationship and trust building exercises.

5. Collective Belief: Call it swagger, confidence or "buy-in." Effective football teams believe they are capable of big things. This sense of confidence in the team translates into a winning attitude that becomes self-fulfilling. Our Rotary clubs do a great job of building group buy-in with shared understanding of concepts like the Five Avenues of Service, the Four-Way Test, and our motto of Service Above Self.

Rotary is one of my favorite teams. We have team colors (blue and gold - not maize), a team founder and mascot (Paul Harris), a team logo (the Rotary wheel), and even a team cheer song (R-O-T-A-R-Y!). We also have our own living legend in T.D. Griley, our District's sole living past RI Director, Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees member and aide to two RI Presidents! If you haven't already met T.D., attend a Newark Rotary meeting on just about any Tuesday and make a point to get to know him!

Through teamwork, we further our motto, "Service Above Self." And, one of the great things about Rotary as opposed to football is that when our team wins, everyone wins - "across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves!"
