Rotary Public Image - Dave Ungar, District Public Image Co-Chair

Think of one of the most memorable advertisements you've seen. As good as it was, did you run right out to buy the product? Or did you make the decision to buy when you were looking at the product on a shelf next to other, similar brands? The one with the great ad looked a little more familiar, a little more valuable.

Rotary is no different. We need to continually remind people who Rotary is and the principles it represents. People aren't going to see a story about Rotary and immediately say "I want to Join Rotary." They are going to digest it and later, when they say to themselves, "I need to get more involved in my community" or " if we were organized to cooperate, we could solve a major problem" they will THEN think, "ah, yeah - Rotary does that."

If you are thinking about how to get your community more involved in Rotary, think of these basic branding steps: **Repetition**, **Recognition**, **Invitation**.

- Put your brand & message in front of people frequently. Not just in the form of social media posts, newspaper stories, and billboards – but ALL of those and every other way you can imagine. Use repetition and consistent brand identity.
- Have a presence in the community when people see you, they associate Rotary with you and the person you are. The promotion that is most influential is the highly-regarded and highly-visible member of the community who is also a Rotarian.
- Invite people in. Promotion falls flat if it doesn't include an invitation to participate.

Think about all of the ways you can demonstrate to the public, "Rotary does that!" The more frequently they see it, the more familiar and valuable Rotary becomes.

RD6690 helps Sponsor - Rotary Peace Fellow – Peace Symposium - Tom Carlisi, District Peace Chair

On May 4, 2023, Rotary District 6690 helped sponsor the 2023 International Peace Conference in Birmingham, Alabama, featuring 35 Rotary Peace Fellows from six continents, bringing together Rotarians and non-Rotarians and distinguished leaders in academia, government, public safety, religion, business, and community service to share ideas and propose solutions to some of society's most complex challenges.

RD6690 Rotarians engaged with Rotary Peace Fellows, other Rotarians and Peace advocates, as part of the Rotary Peace Fellow – Peace Symposium Series and 2023 International Peace Conference, May 4-6, 2023, in Birmingham, Alabama. This gathering of regional, national, and international dignitaries celebrated the 60th anniversary of the Children's March for Civil Rights, in Birmingham, Alabama. Event Coordinators were the Rotary Club of Birmingham, City of Birmingham, and the Civil Rights Institute of U. of Alabama – Birmingham.

The Rotary Peace Fellow – Peace Symposium - kicked off the 3-day event, by bringing 35 Rotary Peace Fellows, from 6 continents, together with Rotarians from USA & Canada. These



Peacebuilders participated in training workshops, and collaborated to work on Peace Projects that featured the RI 7 Areas of Focus. The RPF Peace Symposium Series stages include PREPARE (pre-event), PLAN (May 4-6), PERFORM (post-Event).

RD6690 was one of the event sponsors, and was represented in-person by Tom Carlisi, RD6690 Peace Chair (Columbus Rotary) and Joe Evans (Delaware Rotary). Other RD6690 Rotarian participants (online only) include Paul Kulik (Westerville Sunrise Rotary), Sheila Mark (Athens Rotary), Cornelius "Mac" McGrady (Reynoldsburg-Pickerington Rotary), Craig Klein (Wellston Rotary), and Bill Grindle (Worthington AM Rotary).
