## Breaking Down Barriers That Keep People From a Healthy Lifestyle

At our March 2<sup>nd</sup> Rotary meeting, we had Tim Tatum and Brian Fretwell with Direct Primary Care Associates come speak with us and introduce a new model to healthcare that gets us back to the comforts we can remember of healthcare in the past.

Direct Primary Care is excited to share their venture to getting back to the classic provider-patient relationship that makes you feel like more than just another appointment being filled. Their healthcare model prides itself on only taking in one patient at a time. They like to think of this as getting back to the way medicine used to be for our parents and grandparents before demand outweighed focused capacity.

There are currently three providers at Direct Primary Care, and each have a certain allotted number of appointments available in a day (usually between 6-8). What this means is that when you set an appointment at 9:30am, you will be seen at 9:30am, not hours later when your doctor becomes available. This provides a great opportunity for busy patients that otherwise would not be able to afford the long wait times, breaking down barriers that would keep people from a healthy lifestyle.

What really makes DPC unique is their membership model. Their offices are doing away with copays and deductibles, and instead offering their services at a monthly membership fee. These memberships can be by individual or family plans, with prices starting at \$60 a month per individual (\$720/year), and a family maximum payment of \$180 a month.

DPC also proudly serves a wide variety of healthcare needs to encompass a full spectrum of primary care. From mental health services to physical therapy to allergy shots, whatever your healthcare needs, Direct Primary Care is your go-to source for your healthiest life.

They are also working to help businesses bridge the gap between where they are and where they need to be in regard to healthcare benefits for employees. They currently have 39 businesses they have partnered with. The advantage for these businesses is that nothing they do in their clinic will go towards insurance claims. This means those yearly premiums are coming down, making healthcare provisions affordable for








## Results from last week's poll: What type of Oceanography would you want to do?
