Book Mobile in Development to Serve Cumberland County Residents

Wayne Schobel, Administrative Assistant at the Arts Circle Library and Dr. Stephanie Speich, from the Cumberland County School District, Supervisor K-8th grade, spoke about the development of a Book Bus for Kids and Seniors around the county.

The school district and library have raised \$40,000 to acquire and convert a retired school bus into a book mobile.

"The primary goal of the Book Bus is to promote literacy, equity and a love of reading by providing free, high-quality books to children, especially in economically disadvantaged communities," says Wayne Schobel.

For seniors, it will be a convenient mobile source of library books to check out.

Wayne is working with club leadership on writing a Rotary District grant, combined with a grant from the club foundation to meet SOME of the expenses for the operation and maintenance of the Book Bus.

WORLD IMMUNIZATION WEEK: Vaccines Keep Communities Healthy

Progress in the fight against polio shows why vaccination is important.

Increasing awareness about the power of vaccines and closing immunization gaps could protect millions of people worldwide from vaccine-preventable diseases, including polio, according to the World Health Organization. [World Immunization Week](#), 24-30 April, is an opportunity to focus on that work, and the robust polio eradication infrastructure built by Rotary and our partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) provides a model for it.

The GPEI estimates that polio vaccines have saved an estimated 20 million children around the world from paralysis. When Rotary helped launch the GPEI in 1988, the disease paralyzed more than 1,000 people worldwide every day, most of them young children. Since then, Rotary and its partners have reduced the number of polio cases by 99%, and so far in 2025, there are just eight cases of polio caused by the wild poliovirus. Afghanistan and Pakistan are the only two countries where the "wild poliovirus" remains endemic.

The RLI Fee for Parts I, II & III, in-person is **\$60** per Participant per Part.

This fee covers RLI materials, a light breakfast, and lunch.

Payment by bank card or by ACH online during registration is preferred.

If paying by club or personal check, make payable to **RLI-HOA** and bring it to the session.

The RLI courses are designed to be taken in sequence, beginning with Part I, then II, III and Graduate. Each Part is a prerequisite for taking the next RLI Part.

Please participate in all topic sessions on Saturday to receive credit for completing your Part. Rotarians who have completed all three RLI Parts are considered RLI Graduates.

There will be RLI Levels I-II-III offered in Crossville. **There will be two graduate courses in Crossville but not the usual offerings. You will get graduate credit and you don't have to have had any prior RLI classes.**

Graduate Course #1: Instead, there will be a D-I-S-C Workshop offered on Saturday morning, 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. CDT. It is titled, ***Understanding Others by First Understanding Yourself***. This workshop is open to anyone in Rotary and spouses. Limited to 30 participants. The workshop will be facilitated by Rotarian Greg Maciolek. He has facilitated these workshops since 1994. There will be about 20-25 minutes of pre-work required. The registration deadline for this workshop is Wednesday, September 24th. **The cost of this workshop will be \$80.**

You will receive a link from Greg Maciolek when you register for this course that will take you to the DISC Assessment. You will have choices on which to focus when answering the questions when you start the assessment. Don't overthink the answers. Contact Greg Maciolek at Greg@gregmaciolek.com.

S-Steadiness - Indirect and open, slow-paced and people-oriented, focuses on pace and consistency, supportive

C-Conscientious - Indirect and guarded, slow-paced and task-oriented. Focuses on procedures and constraints, analytical
