CRIME STOPPERS HAS MANY DIFFERENT FUNCTIONS

Crime Stoppers of Crossville-Cumberland County helps area law enforcement agencies in many ways.

First, it offers rewards for good tips in catching wanted criminals, according to Tim Vandever, a detective with the Crossville Police Department, who spoke to the club last weeki. Also appearing was Donnie Moody, the Community Con with Crime Stoppers.

When a person phones in an anonymous tip, and the person in question is caught, the tipper is given a number which he can take to a designated bank to get the reward, the two men said.

Donnie pointed out that most of the tippers are friends of the wanted criminals who are looking for money.

Crime Stoppers also alents are residents to scams, which are common here because of the large senior-citizen population. There are crypto-currency scams, scammers claiming to be IRS agents, construction scams, "sweetheart" scams If a person receives a call from a voice sounding like someone they know, make sure to ask that voice a question that only the person you know would know the answer to, Tim advised.

Also, if someone you know falls in love with someone they have not met in person, and tries to send that person money, it's likely a scam.

There are also work scams, in which a person is promised money for doing a fairly easy task, they said. If a sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
