## It's Flatpicking Time With Steve Kaufman At Wednesday's Meeting

Probably for the first time ever, "flatpicking" is coming to the Rotary Club of Farragut. And the best of the best will be with us Wednesday — **Steve Kaufman** of Maryville, the three-time winner of the National Flatpicking Championship.



And you ask — what is flatpicking? Glad you asked. Here's what we found: "The simplest, broadest, and most general way to define flatpicking is to say that it is the technique of playing

a guitar with a flat pick (or plectrum), sometimes called a straight pick vs. the use of bare fingers, fingerpicks, or a thumbpick."

Our resident fiddler **Mike Singletary** will be introducing Steve and also joining him on a few songs.

He was only 21 when he won his first title and he's the first-ever three-time champion. Since 1990 Steve has developed the reputation of being labeled the "World's Guitar Instructor." You can click on this <u>LINK</u> to read more about Steve.

Steve began touring the world conducting seminars, workshops, clinics and concerts in 1990 and after five years he and his wife, Donna, began "Steve Kaufman's Flatpicking Kamp." Every other year they have added more camps into their agenda and now under the title "Steve Kaufman's Acoustic Kamps" they host two Flatpicking Kamps, Fingerpicking Kamp, Old Time Banjo, Bluegrass Banjo, Old Time Fiddle, Bluegrass Fiddle, two Bass Kamps, Songwriting Kamp, Vocals Kamp, Mountain Dulcimer Kamp, Celtic Harp, Resophonic Guitar and Mandolin Kamp as well.

They have grown into the largest Kamps of their kind in the world with students traveling from around the world to Maryville. Steve and Donna have received the Gold Award from a reader's poll in Acoustic Guitar Magazine for running the "Best Workshops, Seminars and Camps" every year since 2002.

## Mayor Jacobs Discusses Education, Growth, Land Usage and Projects

**Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs** joined us Wednesday and his messages focused on growth, why businesses and people are moving here and a pair of educational issues. Jacobs, 55, moved to Knoxville in December 1994 and in 2018 was elected county mayor and he's now in his second four-year term.



He mentioned two issues to consider in the education field:

- "We have got to increase our third grade literacy rate. That rate indicates if our kids will have chances to be successful in high school. We don't read like we used to in our families."
- "Our high schools are focusing too much on preparing students for college when kids need to be offered

different pathways. Not every one is interested in college and we should make studying the trades (electrical, plumbing, construction, etc.) available. Let's start working with business and industry on this."

He cited the quality of life enjoyed by people in Knoxville and Knox County, our recreational offerings, mountain bike trails in our urban areas and the process underway to make Beaver Creek a 41-mile kayaking creek from Halls to Melton Hill Lake. "We're also working toward being the most dog friendly city in the U.S. with the ongoing development of our dog parks."

Jacobs, citing the recent news that we have the highest median housing prices in the U.S., wondered where we're going to put these people moving

to our area from other states. "We have a program called Advance Knox in progress. We are working on how to develop high-density housing opportunities and reduce sprawl. We're now working to overhaul our land-use programs and policies and zoning regulations."

He's optimistic these initiatives will work to accommodate our growth.

Jacobs said he had a commitment right after our meeting and left without taking any questions.

**First** — As of today we have only 4 Farragut Rotarians signed up for our **2023 Stream Cleanup** on Saturday, April 29 at 9:30 a.m. And that includes Howard Fass, who is coordinating and leading this fun and great community service project. And we need a lot more than four members to work until around 12 noon.

Our volunteers can park at David's Abbey Carpet and we'll clean the creek from there to behind Costco. Howard says we have 20 pairs of waders from the Town of Farragut but can probably get a few more if we have enough members or guests to sign up. Dress accordingly for the weather and bring some gloves and maybe some water.

**Second** — On May 6 you have the chance to be on the Rotary Club of Farragut team to walk in Knoxville's inaugural **Water Mission Walk** at Lakeshore Park (Marble Pavilion) beginning at 10 a.m. or be a volunteer or sponsor. **Tory Kinson** is leading our team. "The walk for water is an opportunity for people to experience what half of the world does every day to get clean water.

It is a 3-mile walk where they carry buckets, fill them with water and walk back to the starting point to have the water cleansed," Tory says. We need between 10-30 volunteers in total. The registration price is \$25 for adults and \$10 for kids. All proceeds will go to defraying the cost of the event and the remainder to the Water Mission.

This will be Jonathan's fifth time running in Boston and this is Hank's first trip on the course. They'll be running with three Knoxville buddies and they're all in the picture, left to right — Michael Faulk, Jonathan, Andy Broome, Hank, and Aaron Wise. Billy Hicks, Joe's brother, is also running.

Jonathan's wife and far better half, Betsy, is not competing this year due to some injuries she's nursing.

Can Hank beat Dad? "Yes, he's much faster than me," Jonathan said. "Hank will run with Aaron and Andy as long as he can and I'll be behind cheering them on." Hank had to qualify to get into the huge field of approximately 30,000 runners.

The Boston Marathon is the world's oldest annual marathon and includes runners from all 50 states and from 121 countries.
