Knoxville Ice Bears Mike Murray Will Be Talking Hockey Wednesday

Many wonderful things draw people to Knoxville and back to Knoxville. The Great Smokies. The outdoor fun in and around the Tennessee River and our lakes. The beauty. The people. The lifestyles. UT. But, ice hockey? It happened. It's still happening.

It happened to our Wednesday speaker — **President/General Manager/Owner Mike Murray** of the Knoxville Ice Bears professional ice hockey team. Originally from Kingston, Ontario, Canada, Murray has enjoyed a very decorated professional hockey career. In 1984, at the age



of 17, he was drafted by the New York Islanders of the NHL,

becoming their youngest draft choice to date. He was later traded to the Philadelphia Flyers where he signed a multi-year contract. As a player, Mike played over 850 professional games, contributing a combined total of 424 goals and 484 assists for 908 points.

He first arrived in Knoxville in the early 1990's to join the then-Knoxville Cherokees of the ECHL for the remaining 20 games of their season. He fell in love with Knoxville, and after two seasons playing in Europe (Germany, Denmark) he returned to call Knoxville "home."

In 2005, Murray joined the Ice Bears ownership group to help keep hockey in Knoxville. Shortly thereafter, he welcomed the opportunity to take full control as team owner, president, and general manager with the understanding that the product, community, overall fan support, and charity aspects of the job are key ingredients to its continued growth and overall success.

To date, he has overseen a league leading four SPHL President's Cup trophies and five regular season titles the Ice Bears have won and he is planning to provide hockey entertainment within the Knoxville sports landscape for many years to come.



Report From Your Wednesday Board of Directors Meeting

Your **Board of Directors** met Wednesday and here is a look at what transpired.

- Secretary Sonya Ford reported that we now have 88 members and our March attendance was 64%.
- President Val reported that our club made a little more than \$17,000 from the Top Golf Tournament.
- The Board agreed to discontinue paying \$1,200 a year for weekly advertising in <u>KnoxTNToday.com</u>
- Approved paying a \$1,500 deposit to secure the venue at Riverview Farms for a fundraiser there next fall.



And we welcomed Judith Bradbury as club member in attendance.

Two issues were raised and discussed with no final resolutions. They are:

1. The question was posed as to the importance of our club getting the "STAR" recognition again from Dist. 6780 at the uncoming Γ

the "STAR" recognition again from Dist. 6780 at the upcoming District Conference in Cookeville. This is an award our club has always received since it began in 2004-2005. The STAR award recognizes every club whose annual contribution level reaches an average of \$100 per member to The Rotary Foundation. Several board members mentioned wanting our funds to stay local. The Board will be holding a vote at a later time to determine if the club wants to contribute additional funds for this recognition.

2. The question was posed about raising dues to 325 + 25 for Paul Harris for a total of 350/qtr, however it was noted that the Rule of 85 members are paying 51/qtr. It was determined that the reasoning for billing 51 to the Rule of 85 members needs to be reviewed prior to voting to raise dues and by how much.

News About The CART Fund

The Rotary Club of Farragut with our Blue Buckets is a contributing club to the **The CART Fund** (Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust) with our members having donated over \$1,300 in the blue buckets during club meetings.



Tom Woodbery who leads our CART efforts, share that after a record fundraising year and an increased number of grant applications, the Executive Committee of The CART Fund, under the direction and advice of the Scientific Review Panel, has announced the organization will award a record \$1.4 million in Alzheimer's research grants in 2024.

The top award, the Roger Ackerman Memorial Grant for \$300,000, will be presented to Ana Griciuc, Ph.D., from Massachusetts General Hospital and Harvard Medical School. Her project is titled "Utilizing CD33-targeting antisenseoligonucleotides to reduce Alzheimer's Disease Pathology."

New Rotary State License Plate To Benefit Tennessee Rotarians

An initiative by **Rotary District 6760** to have a specialty plate dedicated to Promoting Peace has been approved by the Tennessee State Legislature and the campaign to get 1,000 registered motorists signed up is underway.

Here are the details:

1. The first year's \$35 will be covered by donations from the Districts. The goal is for \$35,000 to be donated from club foundations so that no one has to pay the \$35 the first year.

2. You don't have to be a Rotarian to have the plate, which is a big deal. Anyone can sign up for the plate and the \$35 still comes to the Rotary districts of Tennessee. As a bit of information, the "Don't Tread on Me" plate has almost 29,000 motorists who display it, and it generates about \$1 million



dollars to their organization. This needs to be accomplished by June 30, 2024.

4. \$20,000 has been pledged so far by clubs.

The first 1,000 plates reserved are free the first year (\$35 annual fee is added to vehicle registration renewals). Net proceeds fund community peace projects organized by the 7,000+ Tennessee Rotarians. First editions expected on or before October 2024.

Today's Weight-Loss Drugs: Which One?

Today **Dr. Charlie Barnett** discusses the FDA-approved drugs being used and available for those trying to drop pounds. Very interesting and very timely.

A recent study in the journal "Obesity" compared the relative effectiveness of the different but FDA approved weight loss drug classes of GLP-1, stimulants, anti-depressants, and fat blockers.



I apologize for the long un-pronounceable words, but to orient you to the various drug names available: the GLP-1 drugs are

tirzepatide (Mounjaro, Zepbound), semaglutide (Ozempic, Rybelsus, Wegovy), liraglutide (Victoza, Saxenda); the stimulant is phenterermine-topiramate (Qsymia); the anti-depressant is naltrexone-bupropion (Contrave); the fat blocker is Orlistat (Xenical, Alli).

This study looked at 35,000 patients and found that tirzepatide was superior to all others in weight loss achieved, reduced A-1-C, lower total cholesterol, lower low-density cholesterol (the bad guy), higher in high-density cholesterol (the good guy), lower in total triglycerides and finally better in improving blood pressure.

How important is this? The DIRECT trial showed that 86% of participates were no longer diabetic after achieving a weight loss of 15 kg (33 lbs). Want to cure diabetes? Lose weight...it's that simple. Tirzepatide can help.
