Mobile Meals & Val Privett Making A Big Difference for Knox County Seniors

Mobile Meals matters. So does Val Privett.

Sara Keel did not use these exact words this past Wednesday to describe this important program that feeds more than 1,100 Knox County seniors five days a week. But it became very clear how much this Community Action Committee (CAC) nutritional and caring safety net really means to its recipients.

Keel, the Community Engagement Manager for Mobile Meals, said the backbone of the program are the volunteers who deliver 3,000-plus meals each day Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. to around 1 or 2 p.m. — volunteers like our busy president, Val.



At the end of her presentation, Keel pivoted to surprise Val with a Certificate of Appreciation Award for her 20 years of delivering meals 45 weeks of the year. Doing the math, she has delivered more than 4,500 Mobile Meals. "I love volunteering for the charities and groups I love and I love Mobile Meals and those they serve," Val said.

In addition to the meals, the volunteers provide social interaction with the seniors, safety checks about their living environments and noting any concerns they have about the seniors. It's not just about the meals. There are three qualifying factors for seniors to be assisted — they must be 60 years old or above, living alone and unable to prepare meals for themselves. "Something we are very proud to share — we have no waiting list. When someone is added we take care of them," she said.

The program is growing now. "We have more seniors, assisted living facilities have raised prices some 40%," Keel said, "forcing many seniors to live at home alone. One in four suffer from isolation issues and 13.6% are malnourished."

Mobile Meals also makes the most of every penny—each meal costs only \$3.60. But the numbers cited above means the program needs to increase its budget by \$75,000 in the next two years. And the seniors do not pay for the meals.
