Jimmy Hyams To Talk UT Football, Basketball on Wednesday

Jimmy Hyams, sports director for 99.1 FM The Sports Animal in Knoxville and cohost of Sports Talk five days a week, will be speaking Wednesday about University of Tennessee football and basketball. And on Thursday, August 25, he will be inducted into the Greater Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame at its 41st induction ceremony at the Knoxville Convention Center.

This man stays busy and never slows down. During football season he also co-hosts Football Finals, the SEC Notebook and Sunday Sports Sound-Off. And he has hosted a Golf Talk show for 22 years. He's pictured here on the right interviewing a guest.

After 20-plus years as a sportswriter, Hyams changed professions in 1998 and was named the 1999 Tennessee Sportscaster of the Year. He also won



the award again in 2004. Hyams has won the Tennessee Sportswriter of the Year award five times (1991, 2000, 2007, 2016, 2018) and has won 50 statewide writing awards. He is the only person in Tennessee to ever win the sportswriter and sportscaster of the year awards.

Hyams is also a regular guest on the Sunday Sports Source TV show that airs year round. He serves on six committees in Knoxville and he was a member of the 2015 Leadership Knoxville class.

Having covered Tennessee football and basketball since 1985, Hyams also has covered a variety of other sports, including golf and tennis. He wrote a book about Peyton Manning in 1998. He is the SEC football editor for Lindy's magazine and writes a regular blog.

Before moving to Knoxville in 1985, he worked at several Louisiana newspapers. He was sports editor of The Natchitoches Times at age 16. He also worked for the Shreveport Times (1977-78) and the Baton Rouge Morning Advocate (1978-83).

Hyams is a native of Natchitoches and a graduate of Northwestern State University. He and wife Melanie have two daughters, Leslie (29) and Valerie (26).

Mayor Ron Williams Outlines Town of Farragut Improvements

The Town of Farragut has a lot to crow about these days and on Wednesday Farragut Mayor and Farragut Rotarian Ron Williams was crowing. His address centered around a document he had on our tables that was an impressive list of 62 items that have happened, are underway or will be underway to improve the town for its residents and visitors.

"During my time serving as an alderman and as mayor, this administration took on many different projects. When I began my term as mayor my first priority was to start with a townwide cleanup," he said. "Long time derelict buildings needed to be torn down, remodeled or

replaced. This was a critical first step for the revival of our community."

He also took a moment to recognize and praise PP David Smoak as Farragut's Town Manager.

Here is a short list of some of the projects he mentioned:

- The recent opening of Top Golf
- The coming construction of a Skore "Stay and Play" Hotel just east of Top Golf
- Future \$48 million Campbell Station Road diverging diamond design exit
- Future red light control system
- Future Watt Road roundabout at lower park entrance
- A new Panera Bread is coming next to Truist Bank in Village Green Shopping Center
- New Aldi grocery store that is now open
- 4 billboards removed and not replaced
- New Farragut Community Center
- McFee Park expansion & updates; dog park coming; pickle ball courts

That's 10 improvements from the list of 62. "There's still work to be done and we'll be doing it," Williams said.

Our Medical Moment From Doc Barnett

Dr. Charlie Barnett's message today is about COVID and cognition. Here's what he has to say:



"I was alarmed this week when I read a recent article showing that one of eight people with COVID during its early phase in 2020 had a decrease in mental function (cognition) at one year post-infection. Worse than that, those with severe COVID had an increase of 480% in early onset decline, a 750% increase in late onset and a 1900% increase in progressive cognitive decline. Even those with non-severe infection had a cognitive decline incidence of 71%. In real numbers that was one of eight patients. Being a COVID survivor, I haven't hit the panic button yet because:

- 1. These numbers are true only in survivors of the original COVID virus. They do not reflect any long-term connections from the more recent Omicron variants.
- 2. Also, these morbid statistics do not reflect the preventive effects of vaccination or the medications now available to treat COVID.

"Despite the unknown effects of later COVID, please remember that new evidence points to the prevention of dementia with good health habits. Even if you're young without the least worry of dementia, recognize now that prevention of this horrid condition starts with lifelong good health habits."
