Julie & Her Children Join Our Rotary Family In Their New Country

From Ukraine and Slovakia to Prague, Amsterdam, Atlanta, and Farragut on Thursday and Friday and this weekend **Julie Tryukhan** and her two children -- **Mark and Polly** -- have been having fun and



relaxing at Norris Lake with their hosts and sponsors, **Bill and Dinah Vogel.** "That's the first place she wanted to go," Bill said.

They left their home in Kiev not long after Russia invaded Ukraine began and were supported by Rotarians in Zilna, Slovakia. Now they're being supported by the Vogels and our Family of Rotary. They arrived in Knoxville in the early afternoon Friday after a delay in Atlanta trying to clear U.S. Immigration & Customs and spent the night in Atlanta Thursday. They are relocating to the U.S. from their native Ukraine,

where the war still rages. They left behind Julie's husband, Dima, who is a member of the Ukrainian Army.

They were met and welcomed at McGhee Tyson Airport by Farragut Rotarians President Megan Belcher, Past President Jim O'Brien and Bill Nichols and the Vogels. They were her host parents when she was a Rotary Youth Exchange student in 2007-2008.

O'Brien opined that the unsung hero in this story is Oleksandr ("Alex") Shukov, a friend of Julie's and Dima's (and Mark's godfather) who put his life on hold several weeks ago, bought a ticket and flew to Slovakia to offer his assistance to Julie and her children. He then bought his own airline ticket and arranged to be seated next to Julie and her children so that he could help them every step of the way on their itinerary from Prague to Amsterdam, to Atlanta and, eventually, to Knoxville. "I can't imagine how Julie could have managed everything by herself without his assistance, especially at Customs & Immigration. I nominate him for sainthood for his willingness to sacrifice his time and treasure to help a friend. God bless him!"



Julie said, "Well, hey y'all!!!!

Jim, who snapped the pictures at the airport, made these observations:

"It took Mark a while to adjust, but by the time they all piled into the Vogel's car he was happy, smiling and running around the parking garage. Polly fell in love with the

carved bears on the airport concourse. She kept going back to them. Finally, Julie had to sweep her up and carry her to baggage claim."

"Julie repeatedly said that she doesn't understand what she's done to deserve all the love and support that has been, is, and will continue to be showered on her and her family. Let's hear it for the Family of Rotary!!!" And Julie, welcome to our Family!!!!



The Latest From RI About Polio

We've written about the discovery on July 21 of a case of variant Poliovirus type 2 (VDPV2) in Rockland County, N.Y. As the first case of polio identified in the United States in nearly a decade, this demonstrates that until polio is fully eradicated everywhere, all countries remain at risk. Just this past month, WHO and UNICEF released official data confirming the largest sustained decline in childhood vaccinations in approximately 30 years.



Increased rates of vaccination will be essential in delivering a polio-free world, and it is more apparent than ever that childhood routine immunization is crucial to avoid resurgence. The detection of polio in New York and drop in childhood vaccination rates represents the urgent need to protect children and communities from all preventable diseases like polio and build a healthier world.

Also, in an article published this month, the former and current WHO Regional Directors for Europe, Dr. Marc Danzon and Dr. Hans Kluge, remind us that until we stop all forms of polio, every country remains at risk. As the European Region reaches 20 years since being certified as free of polio, the recent detection of variant poliovirus in London's sewage samples is a clear example that this progress is fragile.

To keep Europe free of polio and end the disease everywhere, the Regional Directors call for fully funding the Global Polio Eradication Initiative's strategy at the programmeeee's pledging moment during the World Health Summit in October. Here is a <u>LINK</u> to the article.

Today's Medical Moment: Vaccinations

Here is today's medical commentary from **Dr. Charlie Barnett** and it's spot on!

For reasons beyond my comprehension, vaccination has become a political issue, not a health related issue where it belongs. Please allow me to present a few facts:

- 1. As you are well aware, Rotary has a multiyear international campaign to eliminate polio. It has been hugely successful but has been stymied by the human nature of stubborn, obstinance and ignorance.
- 2. Polio has been recently reported in an unvaccinated individual in New York. Even more worrisome is the fact that the poliovirus has been detected in the city's sewage, meaning that even more victims are infected. This is highly significant because even if the entire world is vaccinated, there is a percentage of folks who will not respond to the vaccine and remain susceptible to disease. Hopefully the outbreak can be contained and children aren't facing the iron lung again, but..........



- 3. Our modern-day polio, i.e. COVID, has killed millions worldwide and its long-term sequel of "long COVID" is beginning to appear. Much of this could have been prevented by vaccination. However, the Internet-educated naysayers doubt the science. Hard facts are ignored. For example.......
- 4. A local critical care physician reported he has pronounced 45 COVID patients dead in the past two years. Of those 45, 43 were unvaccinated. The other two deaths were in individuals with chronic disease older than 85, but a huge percentage remain unvaccinated.

My point in all this is that Rotary, with its international experience in vaccination, perhaps should serve, on the local level, of encouraging vaccinations, exploring the origin of any resistance, explaining the science and removing doubt.
