Knox County Community Action Committee's Volunteer Assisted Transportation

Every wonder how seniors and people with disabilities who need assistance to travel safely get to the places they need to be? For those in our community who need assistance with traveling to doctor appointments or getting to the grocery store can be an unmanageable task. Sometimes the everyday task that we take for granted can be stress in others' lives. The heroes that work at Knox County Community Action Committee's Volunteer Assisted Transportation is here to

assist those who require assistance to travel safely and remove that stressful element from their life. Anytime the program staff are able to match a volunteer driver and vehicle with a rider's request, the ride will be provided. In 2023, they provided 3814 trips, totaling 50,766 miles, and a total of 4,357 hours. All this adds up to a value of \$138,522.60 in assistance to our community.



Nancy Welch is the Program Manager of Knoxville-Knox County Community Action Committee's Volunteer Assisted Transportation program. For the last 13 years; she has recruited, coordinated, and trained volunteers from the



community to assist with transportation for Knox County seniors and people with disabilities. She came to Volunteer Assisted Transportation as a volunteer driver, while she was training to become a Certified Nursing Assistant and a Phlebotomist.

The District's Rotary Foundation Chair, Debbie Alexander-Davis, and her team have provided a great review of this year's grants, both global and district, Annual Fund, PolioPlus, Peace, Paul Harris Society, the Polio Plus Society, and gifts to the Rotary Endowment/Major Gifts. District Rotary Foundation Committee Report

It has been a wonderful year for giving and for projects making a difference in our district and around the world! Keep reading for highlights of Rotary Foundation related activities during the 2022 â€" 2023 Rotary Year!

Grants

Global Grants â€" Jim Roxlo, Rotary Club of Chattanooga Breakfast, Chair

Our District is supporting 37 active Global Grants with a total value of 4.5 million dollars. These grants support projects in East Asia, South Asia, Africa, North America, Mexico, and Central America. The projects include scholarships, jobs training, disease prevention, water and sanitation, elementary education, and peace programs - making a difference around the world!

Fourteen of the projects benefit from cash contributions and personal involvement from our clubs – Bradley Sunrise, Chattanooga Breakfast, Crossville, Farragut, Knoxville, Livingston, Maryville, Monteagle-Sewanee, and Oak Ridge Breakfast. The combined investment is \$280,000, all of which comes from our own Rotarians' contributions to the Rotary Foundation. The next time you meet with fellow Rotarians, thank them for their contributions. The world is thanking us, too.

• District Grants â€" David Carroll, Rotary Club of Cleveland, Chair

District 6780 had \$151,195 in District Designated Funds that could be allocated for district grants for the Rotary years 2022 â€" 2023. Twenty-four clubs received funds for a total of 27 grants. Projects focused on peace (1), water and sanitation (4), health (4), community and economic development (7), and education (11). Twenty-two were for local projects and 5 for international projects.

Peace â€" Ron Appuhn, Rotary Club of Maryville, Chair

The Rotary Peace Fellowship Subcommittee worked with five applicants in June - July 2022. Of the three applicants pursuing the two-year master's degree program, the Subcommittee endorsed two of those, and no applicant was selected for the program. Of the two applicants pursuing the one-year professional development program, the Subcommittee endorsed both applicants, and both applicants were accepted into the program at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda. The Subcommittee members have completed their annual endorser training for the next group of applicants in June 2022.

Giving

Now let's talk about how all those great projects and scholars receive funding from The Rotary Foundation that enables club dollars to go further in doing good around the world!

Annual Fund â€" Andy Anderson, Rotary Club of Bradley Sunrise, Chair

As of June 2, 2023, generous Rotarians in District 6780 had given a grand total of \$487,396 to Annual Fund – Share. After three years half of these contributions come back to district for the district and clubs to spend for global and district grants as well as polio eradication and scholar programs.

There were 40 STAR clubs out of a total of 62 clubs in District 6780 as of June 2. The members of these clubs contributed an average of \$100 per capita to the Annual Fund. If your club has not yet qualified for STAR club status, it is not too late - donations received by June 30 will count toward the 2022 â€" 23 STAR club awards!

• Polio â€" John Downs, Rotary Club of Sparta, Chair

As of June 2, 2023, District 6780 Rotarians had donated \$208,163 to polio eradication efforts. It is clear our Rotarians understand the need to continue to support polio eradication until the job is complete.

Also as of June 2, there were 38 Bill Sergeant Polio Eradicator clubs. This recognizes clubs who average at least \$50 per capita in donations to the Polio Plus Fund. If your club has not yet reached eradicator status and wants to be a Polio Eradicator Club, you have until June 30 to send your donations to The Rotary Foundation!

New this year is our **Polio Plus Society** with more than 100 district Rotarians enrolled as charter members. These members have pledged to contribute at least \$50 per Rotary year to the fight to end polio and will continue to do so until the World Health Organization officially certifies the world as polio free. 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The Rotary International Service Above Self Award is the most honored and respected award that Rotary International awards each year. There are 534 Rotary Districts in the world and only up to 150 are awarded in any given year. This year, only 151 Districts

submitted nominations and only 80 were awarded this year.



Dave Baumgartner of the Rotary Club of Knoxville received the award this year. He was nominated by District Governor, Susie Cantrell, in recognition of his efforts the last several years to raise funds to help eradicate polio. He definitely was surprised to hear his name called out by Past RI President, John Germ, who presented the award to Dave, along with District Governor, Susie Cantrell, at his club's weekly meeting on May 28th.

This is well-deserved recognition for Dave and Margo Hughes, his point person for the effort called the Purple Pinkie fundraiser. The effort started with jars at each of his Dunkin' Donuts

stores and raised a few hundred dollars to last year's effort when 150 stores participated in six states and raised \$1.5 million. So far, the Purple Pinkie campaign has raised over \$6 million dollars. And this year, the numbers will reach \$2 million dollars.
