

CRISPR -- The New Frontier in Medicine

Yesterday, the FDA approved the first use of **CRISPR** technology to treat and actually cure sickle cell disease, a condition of red blood cells that is determined by the victim's genetic DNA. We have never had a medication that can actually change DNA and cure disease. This is truly a breakthrough, says **Dr. Charlie Barnett** in his "Medical Moment" today.



Here is what CRISPR is -- Clustered Regularly Interspaced Short Palindromic Repeats.

Simply explained, the technology uses a special protein called Cas9, which acts as

a pair of "molecular scissors" to snip out the bad gene. These "scissors" are attached to a strand of RNA (Ribonucleic Acid) which can identify the DNA bad gene. Cas9 then does it work. Healthy DNA is then introduced, which

becomes incorporated into the chromosome replacing the bad gene. The result is a healthy hemoglobin molecule and fresh stable red blood cells.

Of course, this is but a single condition but the technology has many disease candidates such as cancer of the pancreas and colon, glioblastomas (a highly lethal brain tumor), and familial hypercholesterolemia (atherosclerosis causing heart attacks and death in 20 year olds) to mention only a few.

Unfortunately, CRISPR technology, like Artificial Intelligence, can be used for evil purposes. Decisive and innovative leadership in both government and the medical community is mandatory. Therein lies my biggest worry.
