VMC's Bruce Spangler Says Housing Is the No. 1 Solution to Homelessness

Bruce Spangler is the **Volunteer Ministry Center's** (VMC) chief executive officer and he was our speaker on Wednesday. His primary message was the solution necessary to solve the homelessness problem here and every where: "You have to find housing for these people. The power of housing is what it takes."



Founded here in 1987, the VMC is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization and offers specialized services to individuals experiencing homelessness and those within our community who are in crisis. VMC's programs support its two-fold mission of facilitating permanent supportive housing for those who are homeless and providing services to prevent homelessness. VMC operates several main programs: The VMC

Resource Center, The Bush Family Refuge, Minvilla Manor, Street Outreach, The Foyer and the VMC Dental Clinic.

Spangler began working at VMC in 2006 and became its CEO in 2015. The center is now conducting a search for Spangler, who is stepping down July 1, 2023. "The people we serve are much more than just a homeless person," he said. "They need our love and compassion and our help. Some 90% of them have mental health issues and 25% have drug problems. The one thing they all have in common is wanting and needing permanent housing."

Contrary to what many think, he says VMC "is serving your own" people from Knoxville — single women and men and both homeless men and women with children. The homeless population is 2-1 male.
