UT's Dr. Lynne Parker Gives Us A Great Intro To Artificial Intelligence

The next great wave of technology began many years ago – Artificial Intelligence (AI). It was being talked about and developed after 1952 when a computer scientist named Arthur Samuel developed a program to play checkers, which is the first to ever learn the game independently.

This past Wednesday Dr. Lynne E. Parker, a Knoxville native whose husband is RCF PP Bob Parker, was our speaker. Her topic was "Artificial Intelligence Explained." This was an introductory 45-minute lecture with a great Q&A session about this rapidly emerging technology.



Lynne is one of the major U.S. experts on AI. If you don't know her, here's what jumps out:

• From 2018 to 2022 she worked in the White House as the Deputy United States Chief Technology Officer and was the Director of the National Artificial Intelligence Initiative Office. In those roles, she oversaw the development and implementation of our country's national AI

• She returned to the University of Tennessee last year and is now Associate Vice Chancellor and director of the new AI Tennessee Initiative at UT and for the state.

AI is real. It's here. It's going to continue growing across all sectors of our business and society she said – healthcare and medicine, energy, education, forestry, agricultural farming, information technology, manufacturing and materials, and transportation and logistics. AI jobs in those eight sectors will be in demand, she added.

Here are some of her main points:

- "We already have AI in our lives. Cars. TVs. Social media search engines, cell phones. Siri is AI. Language information and handwriting analysis, creating images of people who don't exist, robotic processes."
- "By 2030 AI's market size in just the U.S. is predicted to be \$1.8 trillion (with a T). Today we can't envision all of the applications for AI, but it will be huge."
- American students rank among the lowest worldwide in the use of AI tools. "Our country and young people had better get up to speed on AI or our country will drop behind more than we are now."
- "AI will disrupt nearly every industry and state in the U.S. As for job losses, some of that will be happen. AI may augment jobs or replace people. Over 500,000 jobs in Tennessee are expected to be augmented or replaced by AI. Keep in mind that 60% of today's workers are in occupations that didn't exist in 1940."

Parker added these points: "AI is pervasive, and it's here to stay. It will continue to be an economic and workforce disruptor," she said. "Broader challenges of AI are surfacing, with significant policy development needed."

She left us with a real-world request of AI that she made. She asked: "Prompt: "Write a short, poem about Rotary" and it did:

> In the realm of service, where hearts intertwine, Rotary's emblem, a beacon so fine. With gears ever turning, and cogs in their place, They tackle the world with a smile on their face.

From planting of trees to eradicating polio, Their efforts relentless, a force that will grow. They build schools and shelters, empower the youth, With passion and purpose, they spread the truth.

Oh, Rotary members, with laughter and cheer, You bring joy to the world, dispelling all fear. Your hands reach out widely, embracing all kind, a symbol of hope, in humanity you'll find.

So let's raise a glass to Rotary's grand cause, Where service above self is the guiding cause. With humor and spirit, they'll never give in, Rotary's the club where the fun will never end.

Denise Seeking Help for Wounded Warriors

The Wounded Warrior Battalion East, an active duty branch of the U.S. Marine Corps, is a duty station for injured Marines to recover from a lengthy illness or injury. Once they have recovered, they will either return to their duty station or be medically discharged from the Marine Corps.



Denise Bash and her family were at Camp Lejeune to spend Thanksgiving with their Marine son, Benji, who continues to recover from a horrible motorcycle accident and almost 30 surgeries. With Denise were husband Alex and daughter Chloe and Benji, pictured here.

"We noticed that there are some ways that we can help improve the lives of the Marines who are stationed there," Denise told us at Wednesday's meeting. She noticed a few things they are missing and asks for our help.

Here are the immediate needs:

- Many of the Marines cannot make it home for the holidays.
- There is no cafeteria onsite, so Marines have to cook on their own in the community kitchen or order food from Uber Eats or Door Dash (which gets expensive for young Marines).
- Wi-Fi is available but each Marine has to pay for it so they are each issued a DVD player but there is not a DVD library.

"I am working with the Command at Wounded Warrior for longer-term solutions for keeping the kitchen equipped but in the meantime, we have an opportunity to make a difference today for the Marines who are stationed there this Christmas," she said.

We are collecting the following donations from now through December 18th: \$25 Door Dash or Uber Eats gift cards; paper plates, bowls, cups, etc.; and DVDs to create a DVD library

AI in Medicine: Danger Awaits!

Dr. Charlie Barnett, among many others, paid close attention to what Dr. Lynne Parker had to say Wednesday about Artificial Intelligence and its impact on our world.

I thought the presentation by Dr. Lynne Parker introducing the pros and cons of Artificial Intelligence (AI) was most enlightening. Interestingly, and as a follow up to her message, was an article published last week in JAMA which warned of health disinformation being enabled by AI. MEDICAL MENTS

This author used OpenAI'S GPT program to rapidly compose 102 blog articles which

included many false claims ranging from linking vaccines to autism or to the cardio-protective effects of vaping. It was even able to produce deep-fake videos associating vaccines with Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). The danger in such misinformation is that to the unsuspected reader such nonsense appears believable. The ability to weed out and prevent the distribution of this false information is yet to be developed by government, industry and even individuals.

AI aside, may I offer a suggestion in helping you get answers to your health questions? "Up To Date" is a free online medical reference that is well accepted in the medical community and that is free to all patients and

caregivers. Use this <u>LINK</u> to read this report or simply Google "uptodate" then click through to get to either the "Patients" section or "Beyond the Basics." Enter your search term or question (full sentences are acceptable). You can then narrow your search to diagnosis, treatment, prevention, etc.

Hope this helps with any health issues you may have.

As an aside, my favorite misinformation written by AI was a very believable article on "How the Martians helped the Allies in World War II." No joke!
