Former Vol Great Todd Kelly Sr. Is Wednesday's Speaker

If you're a University of Tennessee football fan, the name **Todd Kelly Sr.** is probably familiar. All-SEC and All-American defensive

end and captain of the Vols in 1992, first-round NFL draft choice in 1993 and played four years in the pros, helping San Francisco win Super Bowl XXIX.

The Hampton, VA., native graduated with a degree in Liberal Arts Urban Studies. He was UT's first Todd Kelly. His son, Todd Kelly Jr., joined the football team at UT in 2014 after playing at Webb School. His son gave up football in 2019 with a reconstructed knee that ended his football days.

Todd Sr.'s program Wednesday will be about the "100 Black Men of Greater Knoxville" organization, an affiliated chapter of 100 Black Men of America, Inc. Founded in 1963, the focus of the 100 Black Men organization is committed to improving the lives of youth in general and African-American young men in particular.

The Knoxville chapter was chartered in 1994 and incorporated in 1995. The Knoxville 100 pursues a four-part agenda or strategy: (1) Mentoring, (2) Health & Wellness, (3) Education, and (4) Economic Development.

If you're wondering, here's what Todd has done after football:

- 20-years plus surgical device veteran with a 20-year history with Johnson & Johnson, Medtronic, Covidien, British Technology Group, and now Boston Scientific
- Currently is the Commercial Excellence Executive for Boston Scientific.
- Six-time Presidents Club winner over his 20-plus year career, winning it three years in a row with British Technology Group

Todd lives in Knoxville with his wife of 30 years, Renee, and daughter Clarke (30), Todd Jr. (28), and a grandson, Tenn (22 months). He says he enjoys dating his wife, family time, eating healthy, working out, and working on his lawn. How about a great welcome for a UT Legend!!!!

Baker School Dean Shares 4 Goals, Talks About Leadership & Challenges

Dr. Marianne Wanamaker, dean of the University of Tennessee's Howard H. Baker Jr. School of Public Policy and Public Affairs, did a very effective job of introducing us to the center, the only such school in the state. During her presentation she shared the school's vision as UT's newest academic unit and its strategic goals.

Dr. Wanamaker also is a Professor of Economics with expertise in labor economics, education, and workforce development.

"At the Baker School, our mission is to educate skilled problem solvers and prepare them to take public leadership roles and help our country solve the biggest challenges of our time," she said. "We want to be part of the solution."

In a letter on the school's website, she wrote: "....As the flagship land-grant institution in a state known for skilled political leadership, it is time for UT Knoxville to intentionally produce leaders who will serve at the highest levels of local, state, and federal government. And in the next 10 years, the Baker School will establish a national reputation for graduating skilled public problem solvers prepared to take leadership roles as public administrators, public servants, policy analysts, or candidates for public office. To achieve

this objective, the Baker School has created a strategic plan that identifies existing assets and opportunities, guiding investments of time and resources over the next decade."

Dr. Wanamaker listed the school's goals that are part of their strategic plan:

- 1. Dramatically expand the university's capacity to produce the next generation of public servants who are grounded in the legacy of Howard Baker and prepared to be pragmatic public problem solvers.
- 2. Build a set of innovative, best-in-class programs to support public servants and public-facing professionals statewide at all stages of their career.
- 3. Fulfill the state of Tennessee's bipartisan mandate for the Institute of American Civics to strengthen confidence in American democratic institutions and to renew the state's civic health.
- 4. Respond to society's most pressing public problems with high-quality research and public engagement.

"How do you attract 18 year olds to government?" she posed. "Many of our students are interested in learning how to solve problems and that's attracting them." This coming fall they should have 35 undergraduate students enrolled and the goal is to have 50 in 2025. They are still hiring faculty.

One very interesting program is paying students \$1,000 per semester to observe public meetings in town — City Council, County Commission and the Knox County Schools board meetings.
