Smoak, Parks & Rec Staffers To Discuss Grant for Farragut

PP David Smoak and two of his top lieutenants will present our Wednesday



program. They are hoping to have our club vote to support a grant request for park funding from the state. With David will be the Town of Farragut's new Parks and Recreation Director Ron Oestreich and Park Program Coordinator Bryson Keith.

The grant request of \$2.5 million are for major park renovations and new facilities at Mayor Bob Leonard Park and McFee Park.

"After the presentation we will be asking for a vote to support the grant request as it is required as part of the grant process," Smoak

said. "If we are approved for any portion of the grant it would be a 50/50 split with the State of Tennessee," he added.



Oestreich, who just joined the town, replaces Sue Stuhl, who retired in January after 31 years with the Town of Farragut. Ron was with the Bolingbrook (Illinois) Park District for 27 years. He became executive director in 2012, managing 52 parks as well as 63 full-time and 300 part-time staff. "We're happy to have someone of Ron's caliber and expertise to lead our parks department," says Smoak. "He has extensive knowledge of developing parks and programs that meet the community's needs."

He has family in East Tennessee and grew up spending two weeks here each summer. He loves the mountains and the Vols and has always dreamed of moving back, he says. "I'm excited to be home," he said. Oestreich and his wife have four children, including a grown son who lives in Powell.



Edsell Educates Us on 865Academies

Dr. Amanda Edsell, coach of Farragut High School's (FHS) 865Academy, gave us a crash course Wednesday about the 865Academies that began this past fall 2022. This is a new initiative by Knox County Schools (KCS) aimed at helping high school students deal with what comes next. Farragut High has four academies — The Freshmen Academy, Business, Engineering & Technology, Health, Humanities and Animal Science. The schools all have different academies to fit their students. These schools have academies: Austin-East, Bearden, Central, Farragut, Fulton, Hardin Valley Academy, Karns and L&N Stem.

Freshman Academy is designed to prepare 9th-graders for selecting their Academy Pathway, including a Freshman Seminar to identify interests, aptitudes and skills; Career Exploration activities and guest speakers from various industries; exposure to Advanced Academics; and College Visits to learn about post-secondary opportunities.

Edsell said they are helping their students do job shadows, use work-based learning, work with professionals and connect the classroom with the careers.

The Knox Education Foundation has been the funder and convening partner to support Ford Next Generation Learning and the creation of The 865 Academies with Knox County Schools. This effort is being called "the reimagination of high schools in Knox County." Edsell refers to the academies as "schools within a school."
