Dr. Stephen Lloyd Speaks To Us Wednesday as a Recovering Addict

Hearing from a doctor who is a recovering drug addict should be very interesting. That doctor will be our Wednesday speaker — **Dr. Stephen Loyd.** Dr. Loyd has been in recovery from opioid and benzodiazepine addiction since July 8, 2004.



He currently serves as the Chief Medical Officer of Cedar Recovery, an addiction treatment company headquartered in Mount Juliet, TN, serving patients across Middle Tennessee. On top of his work for Cedar, he is currently vice president of the Tennessee Board of Medical Examiners as well as serving as a federal expert witness. He is an Internal Medicine/Addiction Medicine physician who graduated medical school and residency from the

James H. Quillen College of Medicine at East Tennessee State University.

While in residency, Dr. Loyd struggled with anxiety and problem drinking. An experiment with hydrocodone led to several years of opiate addiction, culminating in an intervention by a family member.

A nationally recognized thought leader and clinician, Dr. Loyd has decades of experience in internal medicine, mental health, and substance abuse services. His background includes serving as the Medical Director and Assistant Commissioner for Substance Abuse Services with the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services.

Experiencing addiction first hand has allowed him to develop a unique approach to patient care that is passionate, effective, and impactful. His daily goal is to help as many people receive the quality treatment they deserve in order for them to feel better, get better, and stay better.

'Bed Build Day' Is Just 6 Days Away

Next Saturday — March 4th — we have approximately 50 volunteers signed up for the **Sleep In Heavenly Peace (SIHP) "Bed Build Day"** at Fox Den Country Club beginning at 9 a.m. Bring your work gloves. Tools and materials will be there to assemble 34 beds for kids who sleep on floors, mats, and in cars.



Service Projects Co-Chair Scott Bertini wants more vols and says we should be finished by 1 p.m. Donuts, hot coffee and orange juice will be available too.

The cost for the beds -- that also includes a mattress and the bedding materials (sheets, pillows, pillowcase, etc.) -- is \$250 and borne by SIHP with money raised from donations.

Should the weather turn bad on March 4th, the bed workshop will be held indoors at True Metal Supply at 1745 Louisville Drive, Knoxville, 37921.

Bill Thompson, who runs the SIHP chapter here, says they have been able to receive enough of a lumber savings from Lowe's to add 9 more beds to our build total, from 25 to 34! "This doesn't happen very often but I'm glad they stepped up for us for this event," he said. "We are looking forward to next Saturday kicking off the Build Day season in a big way!"

LCUB's Fiber Optic Plans & Progress

Shannon Littleton, the general manager of the Lenoir City Utilities Board (LCUB), brought us up to date on the utility's \$135 million project to install fiber-optic lines and equipment to serve all electric customers, a project that should be complete in two years.

This will allow LCUB to offers its customers high-speed internet service not currently available.

He said that 85% of the project will go to a high-grade smart system that will help control and identify outages, their precise location and to quickly restore power. It also, he said, will isolate the outages and manage demand control where and when power is needed.



The investment for the high-speed Internet fiber is \$22 million, he said. "And this will change our lives," he added. "We will have the first fiber optic network that runs from the beginning of our system to the end. It will make a big difference for things like telehealth services, education and business needs."

He says the cost will be \$65 per residence and \$250 for businesses. "It is going to really increase your upload speeds," he explained. The utility has completed 200 miles of the project that eventually will cover 2,000 miles and 3 million people.

One interesting tidbit is that LCUB pays 85% of its revenues collected to TVA for the power it buys.

Dr. Charlie Barnett:Drugs, OD's: A Deadly & Costly Problem

Drug addiction is a huge problem in our country. It is estimated the cost of addiction is more than \$600 billion dollars per year. Nationwide, more than 100,000 deaths from drug overdoses were recorded in 2021. Locally, in 2022, 485 souls died in Knox County from overdoses.

On a more personal level, approximately 10% of the patients I admit to the hospital are due to the misuse of drugs. Unfortunately, the problem is only worsening. The number of deaths in this country from drugs has more than doubled since 2015.

There is no good, concise explanation why the addict continues to use, despite knowing this behavior is lethal. However, there have been recent advances in understanding that brain chemistry changes with drug use (sorry Dorothy, but we are just a "bunch of chemicals"). Understanding the addict's brain is the first step in being able to help our friends, family and neighbors with this lethal disease.

I strongly encourage you to attend this week's program by Dr. Stephen Loyd as he explains this changing brain. PP Tom King has further information on Dr. Loyd in today's newsletter. Hopefully, this program may result in your saving someone's life.
