PP Becky's Been Busy: \$11K Grant for Wesley House Library Submitted

PP Becky Duncan has been busy in her role as our International Service Chair and our grants guru. Now she has a little help. Judith Bradbury has joined the committee and is helping PP Becky. They have two grants in the works — one a single club grant for the

Wesley House and one to help the Slovakian Rotary Club that helped with Julie Tryukhan's leaving Ukraine for the U.S.



Here is Becky's description of the proposed \$11,000 Wesley House grant that has been submitted to Dist. 6780. The goal is to provide shelving and organizational components for the library at Wesley House, a computer

station especially for those children who do not have internet access at home, a work cubicle for employees and volunteers, and appropriate seating for those using the library.

In addition, we will use volunteer labor to categorize current and future books, organize and set up the existing and new shelving, shelve the books, install the cubicle work area for employees and volunteers, and set up the computer station.



"This is a great opportunity for us to involve members of our club as well as the three Interact clubs and the Pellissippi State Rotaract Club sponsored by our club," Becky said. "The 37921 zip code has no public library in Knoxville. The library at Wesley House is the only library serving that area. Our grant has been submitted and we are waiting approval, which typically takes 2-3 months"

The second grant in the works is a Rotary Global Grant to provide humanitarian relief support for the Rotary club in Slovakia that supported and assisted Julia and her children in their transition out of Ukraine. "We will discuss the real conditions and needs of the Slovakian community as they provide support to their Ukrainian guests and build a relationship with them and perhaps other clubs in Slovakia to determine how to proceed," Becky explained.

She says that as we have discussions and gather information, we will keep the club informed and welcome other club members who would like to join us in the development of this grant and others. We also hope to involve the other clubs in Knoxville as well as others in District 6780, she added.

Holder Holds Court: How Adversity Defined 4 of Our Presidents

Tim Holder's program topic Wednesday was adversity — presidential adversity to be specific. Holder, an author, speaker and radio show host, has authored several books on U.S. presidents and is a former history professor. He discussed the adversities faced by four presidents — Abraham Lincoln, George Washington, James Garfield and James Madison.

He listed Lincoln's adversities: the Civil War, losing two young children during the war and his wife, Mary Todd. "They were complete opposites and he coped with his adversity by using humor a great deal of the time," Holder said.

Washington led a mostly untrained army in the Revolutionary War. "He faced many hurdles but he refused to quit. He was bold and aggressive and determined to win, and he did," Holder said.



Next came the 20th president, Garfield. He grew up in abject poverty on a farm, left home at 16 and almost died in a canal boat accident and said he was saved by a miracle. He got religion. "Garfield returned home, got religion and went to school and became our only president who was a preacher," Holder explained.

Madison focused on what he could do, not what he could not do, we were told. "He was too small for training with the army and sent home and went to college," Holder said. "He was maybe our first college graduate student. He was the leading political scientist, had a keen insight on the issues of the times and became known as the father of our Constitution."

Polio Attack '23 Focusing on 2 Countries

2023 is a critical year for the global effort to eradicate polio. It is the year where all remaining poliovirus transmission globally is slated to be fully interrupted, per the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) Strategy 2022-2026.



GPEI says that a unique epidemiological window of opportunity is presenting itself at the start of the year end and that we must capitalize on. So what is the program's focus for achieving success this year? The answer is: reaching zero-dose children in the most consequential geographies.

In the two countries where remaining endemic to wild poliovirus — Pakistan and Afghanistan — virus transmission is more geographically restricted than ever before. In Pakistan, for example, all cases in 2022 were concentrated in just six districts of one province, out of a total of 180 districts in the country. The situation in Afghanistan is very similar, and incidentally, we saw the same thing in other countries as they approached their final eradication efforts, notably India, Nigeria and Egypt.

Here is the latest update as of Jan. 25, 2023:

Afghanistan: three WPV1 positive environmental samples

Pakistan: one WPV1 positive environmental sample Botswana: one cVDPV2 positive environmental sample Canada: two cVDPV2 positive environmental samples

Malawi: one cVDPV1 case

Mozambique: one cVDPV1 case

Nigeria: six cVDPV2 positive environmental samples

Dementia Study: Fate or Lifestyle?

Today **Dr. Charlie Barnett** discusses a study about dementia. He points to a recent study from China on 29,000 individuals followed for 10 years beginning at age 72 looked at their mental decline and its association with six risk factors which could be modifiable according to lifestyle. The 6 risk factors:

- Physical activity, frequency and total time
- Smoking: current former or never smokers
- Alcohol consumption scaled from never drinking to heavy drinking
- Diet: fruits, vegetables, nuts, meat, fish
- Cognitive activity: writing, reading, playing cards and games
- Social contact and interactions

The results are interesting in that healthy diet had the highest correlation with a protective effect and not drinking alcohol was associated with the least protective decline. In summary, the six risk factors with increasing protective affect ranked from best to worst were healthy diet, active cognitive activity, regular physical exercise, active social contact, never or former smoking, and never drinking.

Even though the lower important risk factors were not as protective as the higher ones, they were still more protective than none at all. Also, those patients reporting more of the healthy factors had the best results. Another interesting result is that individuals with the APOE4 gene (which is highly associated with dementia) had a slower onset of dementia when adopting a healthy lifestyle.
