World Rotary Day Project Will Be At Ridgedale School, Scheduled for March 23

When **PE Teri Jo Fox** says she has some exciting news to share, get ready because it's usually big — and her latest exciting news is big. The Rotary Club of Farragut will be the lead club on this year's **2024 World Rotary Day** project on Saturday March 23 at our Partner In Education school — Ridgedale School.



This past Thursday Teri Jo attended her first meeting of the Council of Presidents of all of the local Rotary clubs and made what was a strong presentation on this impressive project. We have had a multi-year relationship with Ridgedale and have worked on a number of projects there. Ridgedale is a special school. Its first floor houses an Alternative School for 6-8 grade students. On the second floor are students in grades 1-12 with physical and/or developmental disabilities.

Its students are from throughout Knox County and it is not your typical neighborhood school. It has no PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) to support the school financially or help with projects.

"We are really looking to have a large number of members from our club to join in, since it is the school we support," Teri Jo says."Members from the other clubs will be joining us to get this project done. We have them (Ridgedale) prioritizing the list, just to make sure we get some of the most important items done for them. No way can we do all of these."

Once the list of projects is whittled down, we'll share what all is on the day's work schedule for us.

<u>Wednesday's Program</u> VAT: Nancy Welch's Favorite Topic!

Nancy Welch is the Program Manager of Knoxville-Knox County CAC's Volunteer Assisted Transportation (VAT) program

and on Wednesday she will present our program. For the last 10 years she has recruited, coordinated, and trained volunteers from the community to assist with transportation to Knox County seniors and people with disabilities.



She began as a volunteer driver while she was in training to become a Certified Nursing Assistant and a Phlebotomist. Nancy has worked in healthcare and been a caregiver for family members and has seen first hand the needs of the elderly and what helps them remain independent, active, and healthy.

VAT provides rides for seniors and persons with disabilities who need assistance to travel safely to doctor appointments, grocery shopping, prescription pickup, other important appointments, social and recreational trips inside Knox County. Out-of-county trips are approved on a case-by-case basis. Fares are \$3 one way and \$6 roundtrip.

The Report From the Boardroom

Our **Board of Directors** met Wednesday prior to the Club Assembly. A few issues the board is working through dominated the discussions but no final decisions or votes were taken. Here is a review of the meeting and actions that were taken.

Secretary Sonya Ford said with the passing of David Fielder last month, out club now has 87 members.

The board:

- Approved limiting prospective members to two (2) meals paid for by the club (other meals can be paid by the sponsor or the prospective member directly).
- Credit card fees of \$12 per transaction have not been rolled on to our members in the past. The club has been absorbing this fee. The board voted to pass this fee on to the members going forward.
- Approved an "exit interview survey form" for all who have have left our club going forward, including 2023 members who left.
- President Val mentioned we are researching implementing a reservation system for our weekly meetings/meals and we'll vote electronically in about a week about this.
- FYI: A service project with Sleep in Heavenly Peace is coming up in April, but the date is not known at this time.

RI President-Elect Selects Her Theme For 2024-25: 'The Magic of Rotary'

Rotary International **President-elect Stephanie Urchick** announced that the 2024-25 presidential theme is "The Magic of Rotary" and called on RI's Family of Rotary members to recognize and amplify the organization's power to save lives.



"Don't misunderstand me – we are not going to end polio or bring peace to the world by waving a wand and saying some funny words," Urchick told incoming district governors at the Rotary International Assembly on January 8th. "It's up to you. You create the magic with every project completed, every dollar donated, and every new member."

Urchick, a member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, PA, said she saw the magic of Rotary on display when she was helping install water filters in the Dominican Republic. Two boys were watching as dirty water entered the filter, then ran out clean at the other end.

"One of the boys grabbed my sleeve and said, 'Show me the magic again,"" she said. "Obviously, the water filter wasn't magic. We worked hard to transport those filters, install them, and work with community leaders in the area to maintain them. But those boys knew that easy access to clean water would change their lives. Knowing that I played a small part in that certainly changed my life."

Urchick urged members to champion Rotary's Action Plan, find a balance between continuity and change, and work for peace. She plans to host a presidential peace conference in 2025 with the theme "Healing in a Divided World."
