6 From Farragut Rotary Volunteer At RAM's Weekend Medical Clinic

So, how did our first service project in 2023 work out at the Remote Area Medical (RAM) free clinic this weekend at Chilhowee Park?

One of our six volunteers was ready for this question: "I hate that more club members could not make it for whatever reason. It was indeed a long



service project, and an early one, but I left with my heart's cup very full. There's another clinic coming up in Oak Ridge, and I personally plan to volunteer for that one and any others that happen in our area," said Julie Blaylock.

We had five Rotarians volunteer on Saturday and Sunday. With Julie were Tom Woodbery, Cindy Kraus, and Bill Nichols (pictured at left).



On Sunday PP Jim O'Brien and his daughter, Meghan O'Brien Jackson, volunteered at the Jacob Building.

Even though the snow flurries (heavier in outlying areas outside Knoxville's valley) likely kept clinic numbers a little lower than usual on Saturday, RAM staff estimated they would serve at least 500 patients while the normal volume is closer to 1,000. They served about 400 on Friday. Saturday's healthcare services alone provided the equivalent of \$150,000 in services, and the three-day clinic

will still provide a total of \$500,000 in services.

"Vision services, which is where Tom, Bill, Cindy and myself were all stationed for our full shift, included eye exams for adults and kids under 18, plus providing a pair of eyeglasses made on site," Julie added. "And I'll add that a couple of the local churches also fed volunteers a full breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Bill Nichols couldn't resist the eggs, sausage and waffles; and he, me, and Tom all enjoyed a chili/baked potato/salad and banana pudding lunch before we left."

Medical Moment Explores COVID Study: Natural Infection vs. Vaccination?

Living with COVID-19: What's better: a natural infection or a vaccination? It's complicated, **Dr. Charlie Barnett** says in today's Medical Moment.



A study done at the University of Indiana Medical School matched 262,000 pairs of individuals, one of which had gotten a vaccine and the second individual in the pair group had a COVID-19 infection but no vaccination. They then looked at the total incidences of new COVID infections, all cause emergency room visits, hospitalizations and mortality between the two groups. The results:

Ironically, the incidence of a new infection was higher in the vaccine recipients (6.7% vs. 2.9%)

BUT (or the rest of the story, as Paul Harvey would say):

- 1. All-cause mortality in the vaccinated group was 37% lower than in the previously infected.
- 2. Emergency room visits and hospitalizations were 24% and 37% lower in the vaccinated group.
