UTMC Vol-Visitors Director Amy Perkins Speaks on Wednesday

Some people may say that **Amy Perkins** is very adept at herding cats. But what she really does is herd volunteers — like our John Hoffman. Amy will be presenting our program Wednesday about her job as at the Director of Volunteer and Visitor Services of the University of Tennessee Medical Center (UTMC).

She is a native Virginian who also lived half of her life in Georgia and proudly claims both states as her home. She is a graduate of Georgia State University in Atlanta where she received her Bachelor's in Urban Studies and Human Resource Management.



Since joining UTMC in 2015 Amy has grown the volunteer program from 135 members to over 300 members in less than 2 1/2 years. When COVID impacted her team in 2019 Amy was able to step in and assist the

hospital by overseeing the checkpoint process at all points of entry into the hospital.

She manages three operational teams, works with hospital directors in 38 departments, serves on the Patient Experience Steering Committee, Diversity Equity and Inclusion Council and is a founding member of PRISM.

Our Board Met: Here's the Rest of the Story!

Your Board of Directors, under the guidance of **President Elect Soon-To-Be President Megan Belcher**, discussed an array of issues at its monthly board meeting this past Wednesday. Here are the actions taken:

- Approved the Rule of 85 designation for President David Bluford.
- Accepted the resignations of two members — PP Tim Phillips and Kristin Abouelata.
- Approved the membership of Tom Woodbery (see story below) and noted that Jason Zachary would be inducted soon since the board approved his membership in early May. Mansour Hasan is his sponsor.
- Noted the attendance of President David Bluford at the 2022 Rotary International Convention in Houston, TX. In fact, David left our Club Assembly meeting early, cranked up his Harley and headed down I-40 West. We think he returned yesterday or today. That's a long trip in the saddle for "Iron Butt" Bluford!
- Approved presenting a \$1,000 scholarship to Luke Myers, the son of Noah and Allison Myers. Luke will be attending Furman University in the fall and entering its ROTC program.

Mexico Grant Project for Clean Water For Kids at 8 Schools Is a Done Deal

PP Becky Duncan can perhaps relax a little now. She has poured 100 hours of work, a conservative estimate to be sure, into writing a grant for the **Heart 2 Heart "100 in 100 Program"** in celebration of the 100th anniversary of Rotary International in Mexico on April 1, 2021.

Becky, pictured below, is chair of our International Service Committee and handles any grants we propose and submit.

"We were the lead club on this project and a participating club on the Bearden project. I wrote the grant. With meetings and emails and writing I probably spent 100 hours or more. However, I was also assisting the Bearden club during that time helping them to write their grant and reports also," she explained.



Our club has been a strong supporter of the Heart 2 Heart 100 in 100 Program. We have contributed to Heart 2 Heart for several years now.



This project was a multi-club project which included all Rotary Clubs in Knoxville – Farragut, Bearden, Knoxville, Knoxville Breakfast, Knoxville Volunteer, and North Knoxville – and Pachuca Sur Rotary Club, our partner club in Mexico. The total project cost was \$10,217. The Knoxville clubs provided \$4,500 toward the project, \$1,000 of which came from our club. “We applied for and received a matching grant of \$4,500 from Rotary District 6780. The additional funds came from Pachuca Sur Rotary Club and Furmex, a Mexico nonprofit that works with Rotary clubs throughout Mexico on community projects,” Beck explained.

Here is what this project means to the children and people in Mexico: Clean water is now available to 4,139 students and 326 staff members. Nine water filtration systems were purchased and installed in eight schools in Huichapan, Hidalgo Mexico. The filtration systems provide clean drinking water for the students and staff. Training in installation, maintenance and use of the equipment was held on May 20, 2022.

The goal of the project was to increase the quality of life and health for the children and personnel in the schools by providing clean drinking water:

- (a) To help reduce the high incidence of gastrointestinal illness and diabetes.
- (b) To improve the diets of the children by curtailing the consumption of high sugar-content beverages.
- (c) To reduce school absenteeism and future rates of diabetes through instruction in healthy nutrition and hygiene practices thereby helping students to make healthy life choices and form positive habits.
- (d) In addition to providing clean water, this project will generate savings for the schools which currently purchase and provide filtered water for students.

“Let's all celebrate together that clean water is now available to 4,139 students and 326 staff members. Isn't it great to be a part of this project and a part of Rotary!!!” Becky said.

Today’s Medical Moment With Charlie

Dr. Charlie Barnett, Doctor In Residence at Farragut Rotary, today talks about an interesting topic — “Long COVID.” He says it’s a syndrome following COVID infection that is characterized by multiple vague symptoms (in decreasing order of frequency) of fatigue, shortness of breath, cough, joint pain, chest pain, difficulty concentrating, and loss of memory lasting longer than three months. Symptoms less than three months duration are defined as the “post COVID-19 syndrome.” “Due to the short time that COVID has been with us, there is a dearth of accurate information. There is no known definitive treatment. A full discussion of long COVID is beyond the necessary brevity of this article, so for more information please visit this [LINK](#) for much more information,” he said.



The two greatest dangers of this syndrome are: 1) blaming the above symptoms on long COVID and not investigating other more serious but mimicking conditions such as heart disease or occult cancer (known as anchoring bias in the medical world); 2) Believing social media and trying different non-approved treatments such as mega vitamins, herbal remedies, and veterinary medications can in themselves cause illness and cloud the diagnostic and treatment process. “I wish I had a magic pill to offer, but until we know more, the best medicine is no medicine,” Charlie adds
