Jeff Mynatt, president and founder of Volunteer Rides that gives away restored, like-new vehicles to deserving recipients, is a

buddy of Bill Nichols and on Wednesday Mynatt will be our speaker about this faithbased non-profit.

Mynatt is the Market Manager of Byrd's Automotive and uses his business connections in



service of his charity. He has been the leading force in getting Julie Tryukhan a car for the family and it was presented to her last fall. He also had a car restored for Meshan Dobbins, the mother of Keoni Warren from Austin East High School (now at UT) who went to South America as a Rotary Youth Exchange student.

Young People Are Not Leading the Drug Overdose Numbers Here

In 2021 in Knox County, 537 people died of drug overdoses. Would you care to venture a guess about their ages? Most people guess it's young people, **Karen Pershing** said. "But it's actually adults in the 35-44 age group."

Pershing, executive director of the Metro Drug Coalition, was our speaker Wednesday, our second consecutive program about drug issues here and across the state. "Those people in that adult age group are working and have the money to afford the drugs," she added. The sharpest increase of drug overdoses is in the 55- to 64-years-old. Here

are three interesting numbers she shared:

- 60% of those who died in Knox County were male
- 265 died in their residences
- A total of 3,874 died in Tennessee in 2021

The abuse of prescription drugs is borne out by the massive numbers of medications sold. In 2021, doctors in Tennessee wrote 4.8 million prescriptions and 3,874 died of overdoses. The number of prescriptions written places Tennessee third nationally, behind No. 1 Alabama and No. 2 Arkansas.

And after Tennessee are two other Southern states – Louisiana and Kentucky. East Tennessee is, by far, the No. 1 region in our state for overdose deaths, Pershing said.

Dr. Charlie Barnett in his "Medical Moment" this week shares news about three different topics. Here are his News Briefs:

"No benefit observed with nighttime dosing vs. morning dosing for antihypertensive medications." Summary: Just take your meds. They don't work sitting in a bottle.



• "FDA panel backs Pfizer RSV vaccine for older Americans." Not approved as yet. RSV is not just a childhood disease. It sickens and kills without age discrimination. This vaccine lowers

the risk of severe illness by 94% in adults 60 and older.

• "Colorectal cancer incidence shifting to younger adults, more advanced Summary: Because of this, the recommended age to begin disease." screening has been lowered from 50 to 45 years of age. The method of screening varies from colonoscopy to simple stool checks, depending on the person's risk factors and family history. Fortunately, another recent study found that the incidence of colon cancer within 10 years after a negative colonoscopy is low. Bad news for Dulcolax and fleet enemas.
