PE Teri Fox heaped praised on the Ridgedale staff too. "It was a great day. I loved seeing so many volunteers come together to help our community.



....And Here's What We Did at Ridgedale!

This is PE Teri Jo's list of jobs we tackled at Ridgedale yesterday.



It took 4 hard-working folks to clean this door—clockwise, Teresa Bransfield of Knox Fox, Jerry Schwallier, Larry Sheumaker and Knox Fox's Jade Ross

- 1. Cleaned all available baseboards on both floors and all classrooms
- 2. Painted 4 classrooms' sets of lockers with black chalk board paint. This required 3 coats, but the teams did great.
- 3. Cleaned the interior of all windows and windows seal. Cleaned the exterior windows.
- 4. Pressure washed the entire front of the building, including the 2nd story along with front and back sidewalks. We had 3 companies donate their Saturdays. My contractor was able to bring a crew of 4 for the biggest project of the second story. It looks so great.
- 5. Exterior gutters scraped, cleaned and painted.
- 6. Planter boxes made off-site and delivered. Area was leveled and they are ready for plants, herbs,

fruits and veggies. This will be a class activity for children to learn.

- 7. Built a 15x20 deck for the outdoor classroom. It is fixed with concrete and has railing on 3 sides.
- 7. Weeded, cleaned, and redesigned the front cul-desac with less maintenance design. New stone around edges, heavy duty weed mat and tons of pea gravel. "This was my priority, as it is the focal point upon arriving to our school," said Ridgedale Per Dean David McGinnis.
- 8. Cleaned grounds around the building, including bush trimming, raking up old leaves, trimming trees and picking up sticks.

- 9. Cleaned the windows of all the doors, then after we left the windows were all tinted to allow teachers and staff to look in and students won't be disturbed by it.
- 10. Tinted the front office windows with mirror tint. This allows the staff to see outside for who's visiting and be safe when that person enters the building. It really will brighten the office space up.

SHP's Top Builder Bill Thompson Speaks Wednesday About 'Build Day'

Wednesday's speaker is one of the nicest guys you'll ever meet — **Bill Thompson**, chapter president for **Sleep In Heavenly Peace (SHP)** of East Tennessee. If you are signed up or planning to sign up, you will see him in action at our April 13 "Bed Build" at Faith Lutheran Church.



We'll be building 35 beds and the Tellico Lake Rotary club will be building 5 that they funded. We begin the work at 8 a.m. and need all the help we can get.... And Bed Delivery Day is April 20....And you don't need to build them to deliver them. We currently have 48 bed builders signed up and need about 12 more. Thompson, who grew up in Tennessee and Kentucky, attended the University of Louisville and Eastern Kentucky University. After retiring from the Dairy Division of Dean Foods in Corporate Sales and Operations out of Orlando FL, he and wife Nancy (his high school sweetheart) moved to our neck of the woods in 2016. And we're glad they did. The Thompsons have two sons and six grandkids.

Two years later in 2018 Bill started the first SHP chapter in Tennessee. Today, there are seven chapters in Tennessee and 270 nationwide. "At SHP, we fully believe that a bed is a basic need for the proper physical, emotional, and mental support that a child needs," Thompson says.

MEDIC's Role Is Big in ET

Knoxville's **MEDIC Regional Blood Center** has come a long way since its doors opened for donors in 1958. Today MEDIC serves an 18-county area in East Tennessee with 25 hospitals, with 129 employees and they're available 24/7. MEDIC's role is major in our health care arena.



Our program this past week was presented by MEDIC President/CEO Alan Watson, who followed Jim Decker's years at MEDIC as he retired a year ago. Watson's background is in hospital administration.

MEDIC's main office is on Ailor Avenue downtown with other offices in Farragut, Crossville and a new center in Athens. They're also serving

three hospitals in Kentucky.

Alan shared some interesting statistics with us:

• According to America's Blood Centers (ABC,) transfusions are needed in 1 out of every 83 infant deliveries, while at the same time, on average, only 3% of the U.S. population donates blood each year.

- 62% of the U.S. population are eligible donors.
- Only 9.8% of people under 24 donate while 68% of those between the ages of 25-64 donate.
- 46% of donors are men and 54% women; minority donors account for 12%. People donate on average twice a year.
- Donation volumes: red blood cells 56,000; 7,000 platelets; 150 plasma procedures.

MEDIC's primary need has not changed — 0-negative blood because anyone can take 0-negative, but people with 0-negative can have ONLY 0-negative.

And contrary to what many believe, there is no age limit for donors. "Anyone can donate, no matter their age. You have to be healthy and not taking certain medications like Eliquis," Watson said. If you are interested, this <u>LINK</u> shows the medications that prevent being a donor.

Charlie's Advice on Navigating the ER



Today **Dr. Charlie Barnett's Medical Moment** does not focus on a single health issue or the latest medical news. He gives us his best advice on how to reduce our frustrations in emergency rooms and what to expect and how to get the best care.

1. Take an updated list of all medications or the actual bottles of your medications. That information is present somewhere in the medical system's computer or on your

personal portal, but so are all the other medications you've been given in the last five years. Avoiding medication errors starts with the patient.

- 2. If you have anything implanted in your body (cardiac pacemaker, defibrillator, heart valve, insulin pump, etc.) keep a copy with you of the device ID that you were originally given. I recently saw valuable hours wasted trying to find if the patient's pacemaker was MRI compatible or not. Treatment for the suspected stroke was needlessly delayed by not having that information.
- 3. Do not utilize the ambulance for trivial complaints such as nauseavomiting, joint pain, rashes, etc. You do not move to the head of the line because you take an ambulance. You are triaged on admission and if trivial, you go to the waiting room. Our ambulance service is overworked and not available for true emergencies because they have responded to inconsiderate requests.
- 4. If you must go because of an acute illness, the best time is the early morning hours between 6 a.m. and 10 a.m. Waiting time is minimized and all hospital services are available. Expect to wait hours if you go between 12 noon and 12 midnight.
- 5. Do not make trivial requests of the nurses such as adjusting your TV or fluffing your pillow. They are incredibly busy and such annoyances can turn the Angels of Mercy's halos into daggers!

- 6. If you are a heart patient carry a small laminated copy of your latest EKG with you. It will save you hours and dollars.
- 7. Expect to see the doctors and nurses spending more time on the computer than with you or other patients. The modus operandi of the insurance payor is, "If it's not documented it's not considered done." Therefore, EVERYTHING must be documented, which takes hours.
- 8. Do not stand outside the examination room door demonstrating your impatience. You will be asked to go back into the room and if you don't, security will be called. It is never pleasant.

Suffering an illness or accident is never a "Disney Experience." However, the ER team and the patient working together will deliver the best outcome.
