<u>Sleep In Heavenly Peace Build Day: April 13</u> 'No Kid Sleeps on the Floor in Our Town'

If you enjoy assembling things and sanding, using drill presses and screwing things in and staining the wood, our **Sleep In Heavenly Peace (SHP) "Build Day"** needs you at 8 a.m. on Saturday April 13 in the parking lot at Faith Lutheran Church next to the Farragut Community Center.



On Wednesday we heard from **Bill Thompson**, the president of the SHP's East Tennessee chapter. He began SHP here in 2018 on a freezing-weather day and their motto sums up what this is all about — "No Kid Sleeps on the Floor in Our Town." And they mean it, literally, assembling beds and setting them up wherever the kid lives. He currently has a waiting list for 147 beds, he told us.

Someone asked who makes the requests for beds. His reply: "Grandparents who become parents again.

Single women coming out of addiction with kids and a lot of foster families," he replied. "Plus families having financial problems who can't afford beds."

Bill and his cadre of volunteers began and now six more chapters are filling the need in Tennessee. The organization was founded in 2012 as a 501(c)(3) in Kimberly, Idaho by a fellow named Luke for an 8-year-old girl. Today that girl is 20 and helps build beds in Idaho. The national organization is busy in every state except for New Hampshire and New Mexico.



Bill's chapter serves kids in 37 ET zip codes in six counties and recently added five more zip codes in Blount County. Everyone, 100% of them, who work at SHP is a volunteer. "Our goal is to have two build days a month and for that we need around 115 volunteers for the work," he explained.

Each bed built, including sheets and pillows and pillowcases, cost \$250. Farragut Rotarians are responsible for 35 beds and the Tellico Lake Rotary Club will join this year, too, to build five beds.

We need Rotarians to volunteer for this major service project and here is the <u>LINK</u> to our sign-up page. We have 53 of 60 available work slots full. Be one of the 7 to give us a full roster of workers! Sign up now!

Still Smoking Those Cigarettes? You May Want To Read This!

Dr. Charlie Barnett's "Medical Moments" offers those who still light up their cigarettes the results of a significant study that should open eyes and minds.

Frequently when reading medical articles the results reported have such low statistical significance one wonders if the authors have actually proven



anything. However, occasionally an article comes along with such strong evidence, the reader concludes it must be the gospel truth. Such an article was reported last month in the New England Journal of Medicine.

The death registries of 1.48 million adults followed over 15 years compared smokers and never smokers. The results, quoting from the article are: "Survival between 40 and 79 years of age was 12 and 13 years less in women and men, respectively, who smoked compared with never smokers." In case your eyes did not connect to your brain, I repeat: If you smoke and are in this age group, you will probably live 12 to 13 years less.

However, all is not lost. Quitting smoking, particularly before age 40, was associated with longer survival. Cessation of smoking of 3 years averted 5 years of life lost whereas quitting 10 years or more averted 10 years of lost life.

Quitting smoking is incredibly difficult. Step 1 is making up your mind, today (not waiting another minute). Step 2 is seeing your doctor. There are safe, non-habit forming medications.
