'Voice of the Vols' Bob Kesling Joins Us on Wednesday!

He is one of those individuals who needs no introduction. Just say "Voice of the Vols." And on Wednesday that voice will be our speaker. He's also a great guy!



For more than 20 years, **Bob Kesling** has served as the "Voice of the Vols." The Tennessee graduate and versatile multimedia host represents Tennessee Athletics in various on- and off-air capacities as Director of Broadcasting. Kesling was named lead announcer on the Vol Radio Network in 1999. He is the play-by-play voice for Tennessee football and basketball on the 70-plus stations that make up the Vol Network.

Kesling, a 1977 UT graduate, was a walk-on fullback on the 1972 freshman football team. His broadcasting career began in 1974 when he was hired by John Ward as a film editor for the "Bill Battle Show" on the Vol Television Network while he was a student at the University of Tennessee.

In 1976, Kesling was hired by John Ward to serve as his spotter for Vol Network radio broadcasts. He sat beside the legendary "Voice of the Vols" for 15 seasons in the Vol Network booth spotting and handling pre-game, halftime and post-game interviews.

Kesling also has a long history with the Lady Vol basketball team. He served as the radio play-by-play voice from 1978 through 1999 - calling Pat Summitt's first six NCAA national championships.

WIVK Radio in Knoxville named Kesling its Sports Director in 1976. In 1980, Kesling was named Sports Director at WBIR-TV in Knoxville and

was Channel 10's 6 PM and 11 PM anchor until leaving that position in 1999 to join the Vol Network.

Active in the community, Kesling serves on the board of directors for Goodwill, the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, the Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame and was the 2013 United Way Campaign Chairman. He is also a 2015 inductee into the Greater Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame.

Kesling and his wife, Tami, have two daughters, Allison and Melissa.

Fox Den Notifies Our Club About Major Increase in Member Costs

President Megan Belcher on Wednesday shared some startling financial news with the club that she received in an email from our long-time meeting host — Fox Den Country Club.

On Tuesday morning, May 9, Megan got this email from Caroline Inman, Fox Den's assistant general manager: "....I wanted to touch base with you because your contract with Fox Den Country Club will expire this June (June 1). We absolutely love our relationship with Farragut Rotary and hope to continue it. Due to inflation and the rising cost of labor, we will have to increase your price per person. Currently, you are at \$14.50++ and we will have to up that to \$22++. Considering the amount of food and service you receive and factoring in today's inflation, we feel this is a fair price and hope that you do as well!"

This is approximately a 52% increase in our costs.

Megan had not a clue that such a huge increase in our costs was even being considered by Fox Den. When she made the announcement one could easily hear the audible gasps in the room. It shocked us all. And Fox Den has given us less than 30 days to react about the future.

On top of this, we have been told that Fox Den at some point soon will be renovating and remodeling its upstairs, which also would impact our club.

This begs the question: Is it time to leave Fox Den? Knowing this is a possibility on such short notice, Megan, President Elect Val Privett and VP Teri Jo Fox have been busy checking out potential locations that could accommodate our weekly meetings. They have visited or spoken to NHC Farragut, Willow Creek Golf Club, Faith Lutheran Church, Fleming's in Turkey Creek and the new Farragut Community Center and all have said no.

"We still have a few possibilities on our list that we will be asking about this coming week," Megan said. "We have to find a place large enough for our needs with adequate parking as well."

Sen. Becky Massey Wraps Up 2023 State Legislative Session

State Sen. Becky Duncan Massey made her first-ever visit to the Rotary Club of Farragut Wednesday and gave us an up-close look at the 2023 session of the State Legislature in Nashville. "It was a wild session with so much going on," Massey said. "And we are not finished."

She noted that Gov. Bill Lee has called a special session in August to deal with "guns" she said, adding "whatever that means."

She is in her 12th year in the State Senate serving District 6. In the Senate she is the chair of the Transportation and Safety Committee and is a member of the Health and Welfare Committee. She served for 25 years as the Executive Director of the Knoxville Sertoma Center that serves individuals with developmental and intellectual disabilities and their families.



"Tennessee has its challenges with so many people moving here. This impacts our fiscal policies. But we're cutting taxes and our economy is growing and that is attracting all of these people," she said. She said Knox County has experienced a 3.3% growth rate and Loudon a 6% increase in the last year.

She shared these results from the legislature:

• Passed the School Safety Act requiring School Resource Officers (SRO) in every school. This \$223 million will provide a

school resource officer for every public school and a Homeland Security agent for every county. These funds will also provide safety grants for private schools.

- Approved budget increases for the Tennessee Highway Patrol
- Mandated a minimum salary of \$50,000 for all Tennessee school teachers by the 2026-2027 school year.
- Approved the months of August, September and October as tax free on all food purchases.



Hot Off the Press: **New Breast Cancer Screening Recommendations**

In today's Medical Moment Dr. Charlie Barnett shares the latest news about breast cancer screening guidelines.

Because of the increasing incidence of breast cancer in younger women, the U.S. Public Health Service now recommends beginning routine, mammogram surveillance of all women beginning at age 40 (previously, the



beginning age was 50).

25. High risk includes Black women,

Ashkenazi Jewish women, those with a known genetic mutation predisposing to breast cancer (BRCA), exposure to radiation at a young age, and those women with a strong family history of breast cancer.

This week, the FDA approved an RSV vaccine for those older than 60. The vaccine is not yet available.
