What's Happening About RCF & Fox Den? Here's An Update

In keeping everyone in the loop about the important issue of either staying at Fox Den Country Club for our weekly Wednesday meetings or relocating to a new venue, here is what's happening to date.

Just for background, in early May Fox Den emailed President Megan Belcher that our contract with the club expires on June 1 and to extend the contract we would have to agree to a 54% increase in the per meal charge to our members. The bottom line — the meal price would climb from \$19 to \$29.

President Megan sent an email this past week to Fox Den asking for an extension of the contract through July 1 plus this: "Would it be possible for a few of us to meet to discuss potential menu change options to trim the cost a little? Again, I completely understand that inflation is crazy right now and we are due for a price increase. Just trying to see if there are any other options."

The reply came from Caroline Inman, Fox Den's Assistant General Manager: "We are fine with pushing the (contract) date to July 1st and understand that your year ends on June 30th. We would be glad to accommodate that for you! As far as having a meeting to discuss altering the menu to reflect lower prices, I am not sure that would be the best idea for us. We have a certain standard and reputation to uphold and take immense pride in our culinary experience here at The Den. While I understand this is a large jump for many of your members, we hope this will not affect our relationship moving forward." Plus this: "From 2017-2021 you all paid \$12.75++ per person. In July of 2021 we went to \$14.50++ per person." Those figures do not include taxes and gratuity charges.

The message: we will not meet to discuss any options.

PE Val added this: "There are many questions that can't be answered yet. We don't have all information from the meeting places we have talked to or from catering food sources we've been talking with about this. It's a work in progress right now. We have several good choices and will provide them as quickly as we have all of the info."

Wednesday's Speaker: Cindy Clark Bradley To Share the Sacred Ground Hospice Story

This week's Wednesday program will be about a very special North Knoxville facility — **Sacred Ground Hospice House.** This house offers those at the end of their life and their loved ones peace of mind. Our speaker will be the woman who founded this non-profit, **Cindy Clark Bradley**, who said she felt called by God to do this.

"It doesn't feel medical, look medical, there's nothing medical here. It's like being in a five star resort," said Bradley. There's 16 guest rooms to give people in their final days the comfort they need.

The residents are admitted regardless of their ability to pay, and the annual budget of the 501(c)(3) is \$750,000. Only caregivers receive pay. There are opportunities to volunteer on the website. There's a wish list on Amazon where people can donate needed items.

Director Gwen Brown handles admissions and oversees the staff and facility. She is an ordained minister whose career is in pastoral care and social work. Brown retired from the state Department of Human Services and came to Sacred Ground to volunteer. Bradley put her to work.

Vols' Voice Bob Kesling Begins His 25th Season

When the 2023 Tennessee football Volunteers kick off this season in Nashville against the University of Virginia on Sept. 2, Bob Kesling will be celebrating 25 years of calling the play-by-play as "the Voice of the Vols."

In 1999 he took over for the legendary John Ward, his mentor and friend, when Ward retired. Ward had a massive influence on Kesling -- both personally and professionally. Ward in 1974 hired Kesling as a film editor on the "Bill



Battle Show" and starting in 1976 he began a 15-year run of sitting next to Ward at all games as his "spotter" plus handling pre-game, halftime and post-game interviews.

On Thursday Kesling, 69, talked about an array of topics as our speaker.

"Many people in our business of broadcasting, at ESPN, the TV networks and college and the pros move around a lot and live in a lot of different places," Kesling said. "I am blessed by being here, working at my alma mater (1977 UT graduate) and never having to move my family around. What I do is so much fun. I still pinch myself."

Risk Factors in Young Adults: 'Worrisome'

In today's Medical Moment **Dr. Charlie Barnett** shares news about an increase in risk factors in young adults for cardiovascular disease: "It's worrisome," he says,

A recent study reported in the March 2023 JAMA (Journal of the American Medical Association) highlights the fact that good health habits and lifestyle changes should began early in life and not later when disease strikes.



The study looked at lifestyle and cardiovascular health in 12,000 U.S. adults aged 20 to 44 who were followed from 2009 to 2020. During that period, the prevalence of hypertension, diabetes, and obesity increased, with obesity showing a marked increase.

Even more worrisome is that only 55% of young adults with hypertension and only 50% with diabetes were receiving treatment. The authors speculated that the under treatment was due to the young adults not being aware of their diagnosis. The attitude of being "superhuman" and "won't happen to me" was prevalent.

The moral of the story is that good health habits and regular medical evaluations are as important for the young as well as the elderly.
