MBody Healthcare NP Melissa Major To Talk About Their Practice

Last week is was acupuncture and this week our program will focus on direct primary care and our speaker will be Nurse Practitioner **Melissa Major**, who is partners in marriage and work with her husband. Dr.

Mike Majors. They recently opened **MBody Healthcare** in Farragut.



They are a doctor and nurse practitioner team with more than 40 years in the medical field. Most of their experience has been in internal medicine, although Dr. Major is a board-certified family practice physician and has even delivered a few babies over the years. During his 17 years in the Air Force, he had the honor of working at the Pentagon as well as in multiple other installations from southern Mississippi to Idaho as a provider for servicemen.

Melissa earned her Bachelor of Science in Nursing

from the University of South Alabama and a Masters of Science in Nursing from Boise State University. She is board-certified by the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners and away from work she enjoys oil painting, gardening, and yoga.

Melissa has invested a large part of her nursing career in geriatrics and rural health patients. Most recently they have been employed as hospitalists in the local area and have served the community throughout the recent/ongoing pandemic.

Mbody Healthcare is a membership-based primary care practice that operates on the direct care model. For a monthly membership they provide a wide variety of all-inclusive primary care services. They do not accept commercial insurance, Medicaid or Medicare. By cutting out the insurer, they say, they keep costs low, access to care open, and decision-making in the hands of the doctor and patient.

Program ReviewAcupuncture Is Used for An Array of Conditions, Dr. A.J. Sarrat Explains

There's little doubt that Farragut Rotarians now know far more about the use of acupuncture to treat a variety of conditions than they did prior to Wednesday's meeting. **A.J. Sarrat** and his wife **Monica**, both Doctors of Acupuncture, were our guests and A.J. was our speaker.



They have been in Knoxville for a year and are partners in **West Knox Acupuncture** on Cross Park Drive. They live in Fox Den with their two daughters. Both Sarrats have four-year Masters degrees and it took six years to complete their Doctor of Acupuncture degrees. They are pictured here talking with PE Megan Belcher.

During the meeting, in answering tons of questions, Dr. A.J. said these conditions, among others, can be treated by the needles: Chronic back pain; Neuropathy; Meniere's Disease;

Anxiety; Macular Degeneration/Eye Disorders; Arthritis pain; Guillain-Barré Syndrome; Trigeminal neuralgia; Migraine headaches; and Bursitis.

Sarrat worked in a hospital setting for 15 years treating patients whose conditions did not improve with traditional methods. "I was the last resort and we experienced amazing success on a high percentage of these cases," he said.

Some insurance companies do cover acupuncture, but it is based on your plan, he said, adding that his staff will check with your insurance carrier for an answer. As for low back pain, only work done by an M.D. will be covered by Medicare.

Two of their current patients are Farragut Rotarians — PP Peggy Wilson and PP Tom King.

His wife's practice, in addition to acupuncture, is in the field of integrated medicine. Nicole's passion lies in treating women's health conditions — from menstrual disorders, infertility and pregnancy, to menopause. She has experience treating couples naturally to those using Artificial Reproductive Techniques (ART) to become pregnant, as well as working with local Reproductive Endocrinologists and IVF clinics.

Our Doc's Latest News on COVID

Our resident physician, Dr. Charlie Barnett, today shares the latest news on COVID.

1. Should you get the second booster? The bottom line is, we don't know. However, if

you have a severe chronic illness or are immune compromised, it is probably a good idea to get the second booster. For everyone else (this is my personal opinion based on good evidence) I would not take the second booster as the current variant causes mild illness and we have a good treatment if the infection is more serious. In addition, if there is a new serious variant in the future, an additional third booster may be needed. Too many boosters may not be a good thing.



- 2. The home rapid antigen test has been shown again to be highly accurate if it is positive. The sensitivity of a negative test varies between 20% to 84% depending on when it was taken and if the person has symptoms or not. This number improves in
- symptomatic patients by taking a second test two days after a negative first test.
- 3. The CDC recommends quarantine/isolation for five days after getting COVID if there is no fever without taking fever lowering medications. There are several nuances to this so please see their advice at this <u>LINK</u>




Admiral Pub Welcomes 'The Dirty Dozen'
