Van Dyke Tells Us About the Work of the Tennessee Innocence Project

Jessica Van Dyke is the founder, chief executive officer and lead counsel of the **Tennessee Innocence Project** in Nashville. Its goal is to free wrongfully convicted individuals from prison. Today Tennessee has approximately 30,000 inmates in state prisons and since 1989 there have been 3,191 exonerated and set free, but only 30 in the last 17 years.

But it is not a quick or easy process and is dependent on a bevy of factors. Only 30 have been freed in the last 10 years. Tennessee ranks 18th in the country of the number of people incarcerated.

Van Dyke, a graduate of the University of Tennessee College of Law, left a lucrative job at a Nashville firm to begin this organization in 2019. Her interest in this field dates back to her law school days in Knoxville. While at UT she cut her teeth on post-conviction work in the school's Wrongful Convictions Clinic and has remained passionate about wrongful convictions. This non-profit is the first full-time innocence organization in the state

representing men and women making claims of actual innocence.

One person from Campbell County was jailed for 12 years when she began working on their release. It took her three years and she was paid a total of \$1,000 for her hours of work.

She told us about one woman named Joyce Watkins, convicted of a murder in 1988, a murder it turns out she did not commit. She spent 27 years in prison and her husband died before she was freed. "She is the sweetest person you'll ever meet," Van Dyke said. You can watch her four-minute video on the project's Home page at this <u>LINK</u>

Van Dyke says "this is a long investigative process" to get someone exonerated our of the prison. "But it's so worth it and it does work," she added. "We just have to keep working and be patient."

"Joyce gave us some advice for everyone — she said 'Just don't ever give up.""

Linda Bellich OK & Safe, But Ian Destroys Their Boat/Home

Our old friend and former member **Linda Bellich** and her husband John lost their home on the water courtesy of Hurricane Ian earlier this week when the Category 4 storm made a sharp right turn in the Gulf of Mexico and came on land at Fort Myers, FL . Their boat at Fort Myers Beach is a total loss.



"We made it. We had a Plan A, B, C....we are in Plan D. We are currently safe, have dry beds, water, food, and electricity. So compared to many we are in great shape," she wrote. "The boat is a loss. We can still get on board and recover most of our stuff but it is beyond repair. Plan E coming up!"

They were able to walk across the bridge into Fort Myers Beach, after showing proof that they lived there. "We got to our boat and climbed over a mangled dock, a small refrigerator type thing and finally got to the boat. The boat was lifted over 10 feet and literally

dropped on to a post. Incredible. The entire shrimp fleet was destroyed and is now in a jumbled pile. One of my friends and her dog had to be rescued from the third floor of their neighbor's house in Sanibel. The bridge (causeway) is unusable and will need to be rebuilt, the electrical grid for Sanibel and Fort Myers Beach needs to be rebuilt and neither place has water or any sewerage.

Just very sad to see such devastation. So many lives have been changed forever."

Along with the 30 or so pictures on her Facebook page she wrote this:

"Boats in trees. Boats vs. truck. 4 boats roadside. Boat trying to get a seat at our favorite bar!"

Today's Medical Moment

Accuracy of Blood Tests for Multiple Cancers

Dr. Charlie Barnett tells us about a new \$950 test offered by Grail that is able to screen for 50 different cancer types in one blood sample. A recent report detailed its accuracy in a study of 6,600 patients over the age of 50 with no known cancer. The test was positive in 1.4% of patients. Of those positive patients, further evaluation revealed cancer in 40% with a false positive rate of 60%.

Numerous problems exist with this test — including inducing anxiety in those with a false positive test, trying to find a cancer that may not be large enough to be discovered by our current imaging technology and excessive testing, including radiation exposure and unnecessary biopsies, which can cause complications. Bottom line: not ready for prime time!
