Julie Tryukhan Says She Is "Overwhelmed With Our Support & Love"

It was a program full of special moments. Julie Tryukhan sharing her emotional thoughts about life then and life now. Her two

kids making their presence known. She's worried husband Dimi will be sent back to the front lines of the war against Russia. Plus Bill Nichols and his warm and kind introduction.

She began her conversation with

us two months to the date when she, Mark and Polly landed at McGhee Tyson Airport on August 5. And so much has happened since then, reuniting with her host Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) family from 2007-08, Dinah and Bill Vogel. She has been living there but will move into her new apartment this coming Friday (Oct. 15).

She has a car now. And as of Thursday, with great help from Tom Marsh, she has a Tennessee driver's license. Val Privett helped with car insurance. Our club and our members are helping with things financially. A non-Rotarian angel named Lynn Christian donated all of the furniture and kitchenware she needs. Vicki Williams has two buddies named Aaron and Amy Crecy, who own Junk Galaxy Movers. They are moving her in — for love — and not for dollars.

"I had no idea last March where my

family would be right now, and I had no idea so many of you would care for us. It is absolutely unbelievable and overwhelming," she said. "Dimi and I have dreamed about coming to the U.S. to live. I have kind hearts all around me now. It's been much better with your help to deal with what's going on in Ukraine. I pray for that day when I can pick up Dimi at the airport and pray with me for the people of Ukraine who will never give up to Russia."

Julie, 32, worries about her brother, now living in Moscow. "He is a scuba diver and we're scared the Russians may try to draft him, but he will not fight for them," she said. "We hope he can find a way out of Russia."

She is looking forward to moving into their own apartment. "When we move life will kind of get back to normal for us. But there will be some lonely nights there too," she said. "But my challenges here are nothing compared to what Dimi and the Ukrainian people face every day now. I remember well the nights we lived in basements in Kiev, hearing the bombing and the gunfire and worried about a nuclear attack. We knew we had to get out to give our children a chance at a life."

Julie endured escaping from Ukraine into neighboring Slovakia, living there and being supported by Slovakian Rotarians. And then getting to the United States, far from her home. "I'll do what I need to do for our kids. And we have so many kind hearts around us here to help. It's amazing the love we are getting."

She is planning to get a Social Security card and do other paperwork needed to work here. She continues to work from here for her company in Kiev in human resources management. "With the kids I'll need a parttime job I think and I hope I can find one." Mark, 4, and Polly, almost 2, are in day care two days a week now.
