The Mayor's Town of Farragut Update

Farragut Mayor Ron Williams shared news with the Rotary Club of Farragut that there will be a new school in Farragut, but it will not be an elementary school. How about a new middle school? But there's a lot of work to be done yet.

At a two-day workshop recently, Knox County Schools (KCS) Board Member Susan Horn, whose Dist. 5 seat includes Farragut, said a proposal was presented to the board and discussed. No votes were taken, but she said this will be a proposal at an upcoming Oct. 27 meeting.

The proposed new Farragut Middle School would be built on property owned by Developer Doug Horne behind the old Ingles Shopping Center and just east of The Villages. The new middle school will create a domino effect: the proposal as of

now is to build a new middle school. Then the old middle school would become FIS, and FIS would then house FPS. A determination of what to do with the current FPS building will be made down the road.

Mayor Williams shared some of the school news in his annual presentation to the Rotary Club of Farragut at the Farragut Community Center, updating Rotarians about what is happening in the town. His focus was on six areas.

"The west sector of the Town of Farragut is about to explode and it's starting right now," Williams said. "There's a lot happening and a lot more will happen."

Here are a lot of details he provided:

Watt Road Area:

- Farragut will be getting a second major food market to be built on the northwest corner of Kingston Pike and Watt Road.
- The town's second Dollar General Store is planned for Kingston Pike approximately a mile west of the current store just east of Old Stage Road. Close to it will be an Advanced Auto store.
- A new 200-apartment complex is being built behind Little Joe's Pizza and they will be fronted by commercial businesses west of Little Joe's.
- The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormons) will be starting construction in 2024 on its 30,000 square feet, granite, single-story Knoxville Temple on 4.99 acres at 13001 Kingston Pike. It will be the third LDS Temple in Tennessee. LDS missionary work first began in Tennessee in 1834. Today, there are around 55,000 LDS worshippers in over 100 congregations in Tennessee.



New Town Center:

- Work continues on four high-rise apartment buildings that will have 286 apartments across from the new Kroger. They should be available and ready within a year, Williams said.
- He also mentioned that 58 condo units will be built near the backside of the center close to South Campbell Station Road near the cemetery property.
- A new Chase Bank Building is in progress and four yet to be named restaurants have signed on.

McFee Road Area:

- A new mile-and-a-half walking trail through woods at McFee Park is now open and being used.
- Plans continue on a dog park at McFee Park.


