Dr. Mónica Lebrón is a big piece of the success that the University of Tennessee's Athletic Department is achieving these days. For two years running the Vols have won the coveted SEC All-Sports Trophy as the best athletics department. They won the same honor from CBS Sports.

A major part of her role is

sharing lead sport administrative duties for both the Tennessee football and men's basketball programs. She joined the University of Tennessee's executive leadership team in February 2021 as the Deputy Athletics Director for Championship Resources. Lebrón first spoke to our club in February 2022.

When she speaks about this success, you will hear her praise her boss, UT Athletic Director Danny White. "He is hands down the best AD in the country," she says. "No contest."

Prior to moving to Knoxville, she worked at three other SEC schools — Florida, Mississippi State and Georgia.

# 2 New Alzheimer's Treatments Coming! The Catch: They're Both Expensive

Last week we discussed the newer diagnostic tests for detecting the culprit amyloid plaques in Alzheimer's disease. This is most important as the presence of brain amyloid is a requirement for the use of the newer treatments for Alzheimer's disease.



The first of these newer treatments, Lecanemab, was recently approved by the FDA. It is a monoclonal antibody that has been shown to reduce the disease progression by 27% in patients with early

Alzheimer's or mild cognitive impairment. The second, newer treatment, Donanemab, is awaiting expected FDA approval. Both drugs work by removing the amyloid deposits in the brains of Alzheimer's patients. These two drugs are considered breakthroughs because since 1998, 146 clinical trials have failed they show any improvement at a cost of \$600 billion.

However, all is not rosy as the cost of the drug Lecanemab alone is \$26,500 per year. The total cost to treat a patient (remember, these drugs are only useful early in the course and totally useless in patients with obvious Alzheimers), including ancillary tests and the IV infusions every two weeks, is \$82,000 per year. Moreover, the drug must be given for years to significantly slow Alzheimer's progression. In addition, brain swelling and microhemorrhages in the brain occurred in 20% of treated patients.

Truly an advance, but it is extremely difficult and expensive to combat the effects of Mother Nature and Father Time.
