He was appointed by the Knox County Legislative Delegation in 2021 to serve on the Knox County Election Commission. Additionally, he serves as a commissioner on the Tennessee Public Charter School



Commission (appointed by Governor Bill Lee), a commissioner on the Knoxville-Knox County Planning Commission (appointed by Mayor Glenn Jacobs), and as a board member of the Southern Regional Education Board (appointed by former Governor Bill Haslam).

One of the biggest pieces of news was about our new **Farragut High School (FHS) Interact Club**. This week Benji had the opportunity to go back and visit the nurses and staff at the hospital in Greenville (more on that soon). He came home to Knoxville on Wednesday evening. Benji got to go to Chloe's last golf match of the season (they are pictured here as Chloe practices). Today (Saturday) he

gets to see his nephew's 1st birthday. Tomorrow we will have family pictures. On Tuesday he will head back down to Camp Lejeune to begin the next phase of this battle. Please keep him in your prayers for the long road ahead." To date he has had 24 surgeries since his motorcycle accident this past March 9 and she says he will need at least two more.

Judith Bradbury is now home after having her right knee replaced in Nashville in late August and two weeks of physical therapy at NHC Farragut. World Polio Day Coming on Oct. 24th

Rotary International is encouraging clubs to hold events on or near our **5th Annual World Polio Day** on Tuesday October 24. Last year, supporters in 90 countries registered more than 1,400 World Polio Day events to raise money for the eradication of polio and to promote this worldwide project.

Clubs that have events are asked to register them using this LINK

RI has a motto for this day: "One Day, One Focus, Ending Polio."

Part of this day will be a live stream event by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Rotary will stream this live from Gates Foundation headquarters in Seattle to bring together more than 50,000 viewers around the world. Join



in as global health experts and celebrities share our progress on the road to polio eradication. When we get the details about this event we will pass it along.

Keep in mind that this fight is not over. No way. In July, a case of variant poliovirus type 2 (VDPV2) was detected in the New York state just weeks after the virus was detected in wastewater samples in the UK. Please read the next story below!

The re-emergence of polio can be explained by many factors, including vaccine hesitancy and a global drop in childhood vaccination rates, but it's clear today that no matter the location, anyone not vaccinated against polio is at risk. To prevent further

cases of paralysis, all countries must maintain high vaccination coverage and robust disease surveillance. The U.S. vaccine percentage is 95%. Fully funding the 2022-2026 GPEI strategy is the best way to protect people everywhere into the future, keeping polio from spreading across borders and around the world. Until we eradicate polio worldwide, it will always be just a plane ride away.

"Poliovirus detected in more wastewater near New York City"

ALBANY, N.Y. – New York Gov. Kathy Hochul said Friday afternoon the state was stepping up its polio-fighting efforts as the virus that causes the life-threatening disease was detected in the wastewater of yet another county in the New York City area. Hochul declared a state disaster emergency that allows EMS workers, midwives and pharmacists to administer polio vaccines and allows doctors to issue standing orders for the vaccine. Data on immunizations will be used to focus vaccination efforts where they're needed the most.

<u>The Medical Moment</u> Get the COVID Booster! Get Your Flu Shot!

Dr. Charlie Barnett's medical advice today is quite clear — get the shots!



The good doctor's opening Q&A: "When should you get your COVID booster and the flu shot? The bottom line is anytime, just get them. However, for optimal effectiveness, with the least side effects" he says this:

Get your COVID booster now. There may be some improvement in your immune response if you change vaccine manufacturers from your initial series to the new booster. That is, if Pfizer was your initial series, get the Moderna for the booster.

The optimal time for the seasonal flu vaccine is October to early November. This timing should help protect you during the early winter flu season. Also, by taking the booster and the flu vaccine at different times, you will know which injection gave you a reaction (if you have one, which is rare).

One last tidbit — "Paxlovid, the medication for treating active COVID infection, has gotten some bad press lately. However, a recent study from Israel showed that individuals 65 and older with COVID when treated with Paxlovid had a 79% decrease in death and a 73% decrease in hospitalization. Unfortunately, those patients under 65 showed little benefit from the medication. Sorry."
