First, and this a major first, members of the Interact Club at Hardin Valley Academy will be helping us out and working alongside our adviser to the club, PP Leah Berry. Meet and greet the HVA Interactors and make them welcome as part of our family of Rotary. We'll also have Girl Scout Troop 20114 helping us. That is Orly Berry's troop and Orly is Leah's daughter.

Second, Walgreen's is joining this event at all six locations around town with a team that will be providing the "High Dose Senior's Shots" this year and administering the actual shots and taking insurance information (if they have it). "However, if the person does not have Medicare, or insurance, they can still get their shot. We will be working with Walgreen's to provide the 'driveby' shots also," Mark said. Mark added that we will have 250 doses available at Farragut for the seniors.

Third, The News Sentinel, for the first time, will let people use their credit/debit cards to make donations to the News Sentinel's Empty Stocking Fund.

To our newer members who have never been to this event — you'll enjoy it more than you think. It's a Farragut Rotary team event and a great public relations event to showcase our club. Wear your Farragut Rotary shirts and hats if you have them.

We will need our team to arrive at 7 a.m. to set up the FHS cafeteria, prepare the paperwork and clipboards for those wanting flu shots. We also will have Rotarians helping outside with parking and with administering "drive-by" flu shots to those too elderly or physically unable to come inside for the injections.

KCSO Family Crimes Unit Supervisor, Capt. Greg Faulkner, Speaks Wednesday

Wednesday's speaker will be **Capt. Greg Faulkner**, head of the Knox County Sheriff's Office's (KCSO) Family Crimes Unit, which was established in 1995 and is responsible for investigating incidents of domestic violence, child abuse, and elder abuse.

In addition to investigating these incidents, the unit also provides immediate safety crisis counseling information and support to victims of these crimes. The Family Crimes Unit investigates more than 5,000 cases annually.

The investigating body of the unit is comprised of eight detectives, four Victim Advocates, and one Case Manager. An assigned detective is on call 24 hours a day.

The Family Crimes Unit is located at the Family Justice Center, which is the hub of more than 60 partnering agencies working together to provide assistance and education pertaining to domestic violence, child abuse, and elder abuse. These



agencies include, but are not limited to: The District Attorney General's Office, Knoxville Police Department, Adult Protective Services, State Department of Children's Services, Knox County Schools, Legal Aid, YWCA, and the Helen Ross McNabb Center.

The Knoxville Family Justice Center is one of the first centers established in the nation and has become a model for other agencies in the development of their own Family Justice Center.

'Wreaths Across America' Locally Needs\$6,000 To Put Wreaths on All Vets' Graves

Chris Albrecht introduced the wonderful **Wreaths Across America** program to the Rotary Club of Farragut at Fox Den Country Club on Wednesday. He is the United Veterans Council of East Tennessee's Wreath Program Ambassador. He's also a U.S. Navy veteran of the Vietnam Conflict.

This national organization works every year to place an evergreen wreath on the grave of veterans on the "National Wreaths Across America Day." This year it will be on Saturday, December 14, during the holiday season and Christmas and the ceremonies will begin at noon.

Here in Knoxville the Veterans Council works to make sure that the approximately 18,000 veteran's graves have wreaths. Last year they had the funds to place just more than 13,000 wreaths, thus leaving 6,000 or so graves without wreaths.

There are ceremonies at three cemeteries locally – the East Tennessee State Veterans cemeteries on Lyons View Pike with its 5,292 graves and on John Sevier Highway with its 2,900 graves, and the U.S National Cemetery on Tyson Street with 9,246 graves (including the grave of the great University of Tennessee coach, Army Brig, Gen. Robert R. Neyland).

The ceremonies around the country are done in coordination with the wreathlaying ceremonies at Arlington National Cemetery, as well as at more than 1,600 additional locations in all 50 U.S. states, at sea and abroad. At Arlington wreaths will adorn the 226,525 graves by that Saturday afternoon in December.

Albrecht says the East Tennessee State vets cemetery on John Sevier Highway is adding graves fast, averaging 15 funerals a week this year to date. The cemetery began this year with approximately 2,500 graves and

will end this year at some 2,900.

"We are really hoping that we can have enough donations this year to take care of the 6,000 veterans' graves headstones we had to bypass last year," he said. "We are hoping people will join us in honoring these veterans with a wreath for the holidays."


