Family of Rotary Needs Your Help for Adkins, Sisco & Bradbury

In July of 2005 a member of our club had serious knee surgery — what they call "bilateral replacements." The translation was having both knees replaced in the same three-plus hours of surgery. After five days in the hospital and two weeks of physical therapy, he went home.

Fred Martin was president and called our Rotarian to see how he was feeling and what needs he had. This was several years before our Family of Rotary Committee existed. The only need, he told Fred, was transportation to three physical therapy sessions a week for 14 weeks. His wife was a school teacher and could not take him but could pick him up. He had to be at therapy by 2 p.m.



PP Fred turned to then member **Linda Bellich.** Two days later Bellich called the Rotarian and incredibly had a schedule for all 14 weeks filled — a combination of club members and their spouses. They picked him up at 1:30 every day for all 42 of the PT trips.

That was a real need then and today we have two real needs being coordinated by Family of Rotary Chair Cindy Kraus and she needs our help and the key word is "our." We have two members living at the Sherrill Hills Retirement Resort off of Kingston Pike on the hill behind Academy Sports. Bettye Sisco and Dr. Bill Adkins need roundtrip rides to our meetings. To date we have only two members signed up and one, Tom Woodbery, signed up for back-to-back weeks in September. And we need someone for this coming meeting Wednesday. The other Rotarian who will need help is **Judith Bradbury**, fresh off right knee replacement surgery on Aug. 23. She is about to begin her second week of physical therapy at NHC Farragut and is going home on Thursday, Sept. 8. We think she will need transportation help beginning the next week. Our Housing Market: KAAR's Sale Not Optimistic About Much Changing



The residential housing market is not good in 2022. Prices are up, listings down and about the only people enjoying it are those relocating here from California, Chicago, New York and Nashville. The high prices are reflected by a 40% growth in sales volume in dollars. The rental market is worse with a 98% occupancy rate and maybe the highest monthly rental rates ever.

That's what we heard Wednesday from **Hancen Sale**, the Government Affairs and Policy Director of the Knoxville Area Association of Realtors (KAAR). In this role Sale serves as the chief policy advisor and consultant to the KAAR leadership and Board of Directors.

Sale listed four reasons driving our market numbers:

- Simple demand
- Migration of people from high-cost areas
- Baby Boomers wanting to move
- Millennials as first-time buyers

One surprising statistic is that 39% of people today are living alone, Sale said. He noted that construction costs are up 22% while wage growth is only 7%. "Affordability is not good and is a problem," he said, adding, "I'm not optimistic that this is all going to change anytime soon."

He said Knoxville is experiencing a net loss in population The growth areas are Knox, Blount and Loudon Counties.

"On a per capita basis, Davidson County's new housing construction is four times that of Knox County," he said. "And there's no new houses being developed in East Knox County because there is no infrastructure there for the most part. That is more of a political issue than a development issue. Same for infill locations in the city."

COVID Vaccines? What Would Charlie Do?

Our in-house doctor — Charlie Barnett — prefaces today's Medical Moment with this: As you know, giving medical advice is a slippery rock at best. Today's article may seem a bit personal but it's the only way I know to give advice and avoid the pitfalls. Hope you agree.

As you are probably aware, the FDA and the CDC recently gave emergency approval to the Moderna and Pfizer COVID booster bivalent vaccines (covers the newer Omicron variants as well as the initial virus) to everyone 18 or older that have completed their initial two-shot series. The Pfizer vaccine was also approved for those 12-18 years that had completed their primary series with the Pfizer vaccine. Officially, if older than 18, you can take either one.



However, there are a few nuances that separate the two. So that I'm not guilty of malpractice or spreading misinformation, I can tell you what I'm going to do. You should do what your doctor advises you.

I had the Pfizer vaccine for my primary series. However, for this booster I'm going to take the Moderna because:

- 1. Moderna has a greater concentration of the immune response producing mRNA (50 µg) versus the Pfizer (30 µg). The downside is that Moderna had a few more side effects in the initial series than Pfizer. Having suffered through COVID once, I'll accept a few potential side effects.
- 2. There was some early evidence that a crossover (Moderna to Pfizer and vice versa) between the primary series and the first booster led to greater immunity.

The bottom line: the most important thing you can do is to get vaccinated!


