Aswe enter the final quarter of our year of "Rotary Opens Opportunities," let s continue our efforts to stay positive and to be engaged, so that we finish the year strong and prepared to make 2021-22 an even better year!

April is **Maternal and Child Health Month** on our Rotary calendar. Rotarians work to make high-quality health care available to vulnerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future. An

estimated 5.9 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation • all of which can be prevented.

Rotary provides education, immunizations, birth kits, and mobile health clinics. Women are taught how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breast-feed, and how to protect themselves and their children from disease. Our first Heart 2 Heart global grant projects in Mexico involved providing infant radiant cradles for a public hospital, and another project trained 500 midwives and provided supplies to treat 24,000 newborns. Several clubs in our district have been and still are directly involved in other important projects for assisting vulnerable mothers and children.



Another way we can help vulnerable people is to recognize and participate in **World Immunization Week April 24-30**. Polio eradication is our prime example of the positive power of immunizations for the children of the world, but there are so many others as well.

In the United States we are seeing some positive movement in addressing the pandemic, but the pandemic is not over, and we all need to be vigilant until we cross the finish line. The world needs Rotary now more than ever, and Rotary needs you now more than ever, so please stay safe and healthy!

DuringWorld Immunization Week, 24-30 April, join with Rotary to combat vaccine hesitancy and misinformation by spreading the facts about why #VaccinesWork.

With decades of experience fighting polio, Rotary plays a key role in informing people about the power and effectiveness of vaccines. As COVID-19 vaccines become more available, Rotary members are using their experience in fighting polio to help communities with their vaccination

education and organization efforts. And today, because we and our partners have worked so hard, wild poliovirus remains endemic in only two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. But to eradicate it there and to prevent a resurgence in other parts of the world, we must continue to build trust in vaccines and raise funds for polio eradication, including vaccine delivery.

At the Cleveland Club's March 16 meeting NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Fran Tarkenton joined the meeting via Zoom from Atlanta. Beyond his vibrant career as a football player, Tarkenton has spent 50 years building over 20 companies. He gained experience in a multitude of business industries before branching out and starting a business of his own.

The former quarterback said he is often asked what is his secret to success and what are some of his key

attributes that led him to his accomplishments. He responded, \$\infty\$I am a product of all the people I learned from. It was the lessons he learned from others that led him to the success he found in business. He also said, \$\infty\$I was coachable and sought being mentored.

One of the keys to achievement is not acknowledging what you know, but acknowledging what you do not know, and having the ability to seek out those who have the knowledge. He went on to say, Every time I thought I had all the answers, I got knocked down .

Some of Tarkenton s standout advice was that relationships are one of the most valuable assets a business can have. Business for me has always been about other people...if it s good for them, I I I make it happen. If it s not good for them, it won t happen.

Tarkenton is out to help people, which in turn helps business. He advised the Cleveland Rotarians that the best leaders and entrepreneurs are those who make others around them want to do better and be better. These qualities are what will lead to true success.

Oak Ridge Club Members Support COVID-19 Immunizations

Members of the Oak Ridge Club aremobilizing to combat COVID-19 in their community. The most recent efforts include a new public awareness campaign designed to encourage community members to get vaccinated. The campaign shares information about where vaccines



are available, along with recruiting and organizing volunteers for drive-through vaccine clinics.

The awareness campaign started in March with messaging and imagery encouraging vaccination and a call-to-action pointing to the club so website as a place to find additional information. Locations for

vaccinations in Oak Ridge are listed on the club s website, along with information about upcoming clinics, as it becomes available.

Munsey's Pharmacy hosted a clinic on Saturday, March 27, from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM in Oak Ridge. Dr. Munsey is a member of the Oak Ridge Club, and his was the first pharmacy in Oak Ridge to offer vaccinations for COVID-19. A second-dose clinic was also held at the pharmacy.

The clinics are being run with nearly all volunteer labor, including administrators and club members who help direct traffic, park cars, and run back and forth getting supplies for the medical professionals who are volunteering to administer the vaccine.

Tellico Lake Club Delivers St. Patrick's Day Meals

The Tellico Lake Club members embodied the giving spirit of St. Patrick's Day by delivering hot meals and drinks on March 17 to numerous homes in the Tellico Village community.



Dozens of club members delivered 260 meals from five restaurants • Yacht Club, Toqua Sports Bar & Grill, Tanasi Bar & Grill, Kahite Pub & Grill, and Rarity Bay Bistro. The first St. Patrick's Day Dinner Delivery for Charity meals celebrated the special day with corned beef, cabbage, potatoes, carrots and a bottle of wine.

From 5:00 to 7:00 PM Village residents had the options of picking up meals ordered from one of the restaurants or having them delivered by club members. When grateful at-home diners received their Rotarian delivered meals, many offered tips. Their tips served as donations to support the club's projects for Our PLACE and the Rotary Scholarships program. Club President John Cammack

estimated the club raised \$3,500 within the two hours. Cammack is pictured checking off meals to be delivered.

The idea for the project arose after the club was forced to cancel its annual charity dinner and silent auction, which had been its largest fundraiser of the year. According to club member John Everson, "In essence, we were like DoorDash or Uber Eats, and that's what we were doing." He added, "We thought 'Let's do something for Valentine's day,' but it was too late and it wouldn't have worked. Someone said, 'A romantic dinner in Styrofoam is just not going to work.' But for St. Patrick's Day, it was wonderful."

Rotary International Insurance News



RotaryInternational (RI) announced that, effective July 1, 2021 when the next RI insurance policy goes into effect, there will be an increase in the per member assessment rate for the insurance. A premium credit will be issued due to favorable loss history, and that will partially mitigate any premium increases. RI explains that even though clubs postponed fundraising events and there was less claim activity than in prior years, they believe the increases are due to losses in areas we are not insured for property losses due to wildfires and other catastrophic losses, as well as COVID-19 losses, workers' comp claims for example.

RI Risk Management will make every attempt to keep coverages the same as current. There is no expectation that the communicable disease exclusion that applies to COVID -19 will be going away.
