The District 6860 Hall of Fame Initial Inductees – Our Founders

As we draw near to the close of our Rotary Year, it allows me a chance to take a retrospective look at how successful all our Clubs have been this year. If we go back far enough, we can celebrate not only this past Rotary Year, but Rotary in Alabama from its Genesis. This allows us a special opportunity as we take time to celebrate those who have given so much of themselves... truly to a level that surpasses our motto of Service Above Self. I would go so far as to say as these individuals have truly given Service BEYOND Self.

How did they achieve this – not through working by themself... but with others – with Rotarians – with you. That is the true *Magic of Rotary*... when likeminded servants come together for all our common good – when we *Unite for Good*.

We have a very robust awards program in District 6860, led by PDG Pat Cross (Rotary Club of Madison) and PDG Sue Mitchell (Rotary Club of Decatur Daybreak). This year, I invited PDG Bo Porter (Rotary Club of Shades Valley) into the conversation as I realized there was something missing. This team came up with something special for all of us!

We recognize individual awards for Vocational Service, Service Above Self, Leadership, but there was not a category for Lifetime Achievement. As your District Governor, I felt the need to reward those who have given the most.

Therefore... It is very humbling and a great honor that I reveal a new category of awards for Rotary District 6860 and present to you the original inductees...

... The District 6860 HALL OF FAME; now the highest recognition to be awarded to an individual in Rotary District 6860.

To set the stage for all of us, please allow me to share a bit of our history in Rotary District 6860, researched so diligently by Bo Porter.

Rotary, of course, was founded in Chicago in 1905 when a small group of businessmen formed a charitable organization dedicated to serving their community and fostering fellowship among members of their professional community. The growth and development of Rotary in North Alabama began in 1913 with the chartering of The Rotary Club of Birmingham. Extension and formation of new clubs created the need for regional and district groupings of clubs. Initially these groupings included territories far greater than North Alabama. Districts were established in 1915 and were reconfigured periodically as required. For instance, all of Alabama was initially one District until the current configuration of North Alabama was defined in 1949.

So, with this as perspective, I present to you the initial inductees of The Rotary District 6860 Hall of Fame.

We have 2 Categories this year of inductees. Since this is a new award category, and being a Hall of Fame, we need some way to capture the most prestigious Rotarians who have served our District and beyond... our Founders, if you will. I believe you will notice a common theme among these Rotarians; they have either served in the upper echelons of service in Rotary International or The Rotary Foundation or were pioneers for Rotary for Alabama. They were and remain now honored as our Founders' Class of Rotarians.

Founders' Class – Past Rotary International Presidents / Directors / Foundation Trustees / Pioneers (significant firsts in District 6860)

The Hall of Fame Founder's Class includes the following Rotarians...

- 1. Harry B. Wheelock Rotary Club of Birmingham: Brought Rotary to Alabama in 1913 our "Paul Harris" of Alabama
- 3. Frank E. Spain Rotary Club of Birmingham: Past Rotary International President: 1951-1952
- 4. Roy D. Hickman Rotary Club of Birmingham: Past Rotary International President: 1972-1973
- 5. Leslie S. Wright Rotary Club of Birmingham: Past Rotary International Director
- 6. Glenn E. Estess, Sr Rotary Club of Shades Valley: Past Rotary International President: 2004-2005
- 7. Jane Schmalz Rotary Club of Shades Valley: First Female Club President and First Female District Governor in 6860
- 8. Kenneth M. Schuppert, Jr. Rotary Club of Decatur: Past Rotary International Vice President; Rotary International Director; Past Trustee of The Rotary Foundation
- 9. Mark D. Maloney Rotary Club of Decatur: Past Rotary International President 2019-2020; Current Chair of the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation 2024-2025

Each year we will also induct an Annual Class, starting with this Rotary Year. The first Annual Inductees, the Class of 2025 are:

- Mary Carol Argo Rotary Club of Shades Valley: District Governor 2018-2019 and 2022-2023; Assistant Public Image Coordinator, Zone 30 2023-2024 and 2024-2025
- 2. PP Dennis Sanders Rotary Club of Madison: Recipient of the Tom Milford Service Above Self Award, District Leadership Award, Rotarian Vocational Service Award, and currently serving numerous consecutive terms as District Communications Officer while simultaneously serving as MidSouth President Elect Training Seminar Communications Officer.

Finally, as much of an honor as it was to unveil this award earlier this month at our Multi-District Conference in Chattanooga, it has been even more special to honor our Inductees of our Founders' Class in the presence of their home Rotary Clubs. I greatly appreciate the family members who were able to attend and help honor both their family's contribution to Rotary and honor our legacy of service in North Alabama. These family members include the following:

We had great representation this past April during the Council on Legislation from Chair Ken Schuppert, Jr. (Rotary Club of Decatur) and Carol Argo (Rotary Club of Shades Valley). Carol Argo, as Chair of our District Leadership Plan Review Committee, is currently in the process of incorporating these updates into how our District conducts business. In order for you to have access to all of the updates, I share the below release from RI Club and District Support:

... Every three years, Rotarians meet at the Council on Legislation (COL) to review and vote on proposed changes to the documents that govern Rotary. This important event took place in Chicago from 13-17 April 2025, and representatives from every district around the world approved a variety of proposals to move Rotary forward.

To help you identify and understand the key changes, which take effect on 1 July, we are sharing this helpful reference guide: 2025 COL Essential Changes for Clubs and Districts. You may also access the official Report of Action on My Rotary in the coming weeks as well as updated governance documents as they become available later this year.

With recent changes approved by the 2025 COL, now is the perfect time to review and update your club bylaws. Forming a dedicated committee to undertake this review will ensure that your bylaws are consistent with these new changes while also reflecting your unique club culture.

As you consider who you are and who you aspire to be, you can also set meaningful goals in Rotary Club Central, not just for the year ahead, but for the next three years. This proactive approach will help you align your long-term vision with your operational practices, fostering growth and cohesion within your club.
