

Update from PDG Nick Hall

After spending more than three weeks last summer cycling from Seattle along the winding and hilly Pacific Coast Highway, I decided to celebrate with a breakfast of crab eggs benedict paired with a delicious local craft beer. Upon seeing my fully loaded bike propped against the Oceanside, CA restaurant, a customer struck up a conversation during which I mentioned I was raising awareness and funds to support Rotary International's Polio Plus campaign. On previous rides dating from 2015, such a conversation would likely have resulted in the person whipping out their smart phone and making a donation. Not this time. "Vaccines don't prevent polio or anything else. Polio and most other diseases are caused by antibiotics", the customer claimed. "You should be campaigning against antibiotics!" There was no point in arguing with her. Instead, I took another swig of a very tasty IPA then quickly changed the subject. She had made up her mind and nothing I could say would change it.

Sadly, it was not the first time during this most recent ride that I heard arguments against vaccines: vaccines cause autism, the m-RNA vaccines have not been properly researched, the CDC is lying, Bill Gates is profiting from the vaccines he promotes, vaccines are causing people to be sicker.


(Instead of offering my opinion, I would encourage anyone who has been influenced by these assertions to employ critical thinking skills and decide for yourself. If you decide not to, then you've justified my use of the title).

Covid related anti-vaccine claims are also influencing the judgement of influential Rotarians who believe it's wrong to even discuss such matters. When I first raised concerns more than a year ago that anti-vaccine beliefs directed at covid could spill over and influence attitudes towards our campaign to eradicate polio, I was admonished by two former district governors and instructed to omit this concern from Zone hosted webinar presentation. "In today's political climate, we recognize there currently are many perspectives on vaccines. As Rotarians, we must rise above all of that".

In my opinion, there is only one valid perspective, which is that vaccination, along with sanitation and clean drinking water, are public health interventions that are undeniably responsible for improved health outcomes globally. It is estimated that vaccines have prevented 6 million deaths from vaccine-preventable diseases annually. That is the one and only scientific perspective, although there are others grounded in superstition, hearsay, and beliefs. These anti-vaccine 'perspectives' have spilled over to polio, as I have discovered during the course of recent cross-country cycling trips. Politicization surrounding COVID-19 vaccines has contributed to hesitancy, resistance, and opinion polarization. Instead of rising above this, we should dive headlong into the issue because it's preventing millions of dollars from being used to vaccinate children. Check it out for yourself.

A pie-chart published in the October, 2022 Rotarian magazine, depicts how funds raised to combat polio were spent the previous Rotary year. All the listed expenditures are important and essential. However, the largest portion of the spending was spent on something that should not be necessary. Of the \$149 million total, the largest expenditure comprising more than one third of the total was the \$53.6 million to combat vaccine hesitancy and misinformation. As noted in the accompanying article, the situation has worsened since the covid pandemic. When considering the 2:1 Gates Foundation match, it means Rotary's entire 1 third portion was spent to counter misinformation! In other words, not a dime of our contribution was spent on polio vaccines.

I agree Rotarians should rise above politics, but not when the politicization of vaccines necessitates that one third of polio funds be spent combatting vaccine hesitancy and misinformation. Just as polio vaccines use an attenuated form of the virus to fight paralysis, we need to use an attenuated form of politics to combat vaccine hesitancy and misinformation.
