Rotary License Plates

The website for ordering a Florida Rotary specialty license tag is <u>Floridarotarytag.com</u>.

They will ask for name, address, phone number, e-mail, driver's license number, and current tag number. It costs \$35.00. Some of the proceeds benefit Rotary Youth Services and Rotary Camp Florida. Rotarians will receive a voucher which is redeemable for a tag once we reach 3000 orders. The state does not manufacture the plates until we reach the 3000 order threshold. So far we are at about 700. The deadline to reach 3000 has been extended to October 2024. You do not need to be a rotarian to order a tag. Even if you do not want to put a rotary tag on your vehicle, please help us reach the 3000 threshold to get them manufactured by ordering one. This is an excellent way to advertise Rotary! You do not have to remember to put a rotary pin on your lapel every morning. It is attached to your car. Everywhere you go will be seen be innumerable other vehicles. This is the best way to advertise Rotary without adversely affecting our Charity Navigator status. I believe once we get the plates manufactured and are on vehicles, they will continue to sell themselves just by being visible. Every Rotarian will want one. Every meeting and rotary event will stand out by the number of cars in the parking lot bearing rotary tags.

These changes are being made in order to offset rising costs and ensure the club can continue to provide valuable community service. The Board of Directors would like to thank everyone for their understanding and support.



District 6890 Raises \$57,529 for Disaster Relief

Once a storm passes and we take down the storm shutters and clean up the tree limbs, it can be easy to forget those that are truly devastated by the direct impact. That is not what happened in Rotary District 6890.

As Hurricane Ian passed, our District collected funds from every corner of our four counties to assist with cleanup and disaster relief. When all was accounted for, we had raised \$36,529 for Hurricane Ian relief!! That is a tremendous amount and I am so proud of the members of our District for supporting their friends and neighbors in this way! This is how we found purpose with that money.

Back in October, we distributed \$15,000 directly to District 6960, which encompasses Charlotte county, Florida, the hardest hit area.

In the immediate aftermath of the storm, District Disaster Relief Chair, Kevin Kitto, sent out the call for volunteers to help with cleanup here at home in D6890. Also assisting with coordination of volunteers was Tonya Royal (RC of Hardee County) who was invaluable in the effort. Two dozen or more volunteers donated over 130 hours of their time to assist. \$13,449.65 was used for heavy equipment and supplies needed.

\$5,000 has been distributed to The Faith Temple Ministries Church of God to offset expenses in their effort to help people of that area.

The last of the funds collected for Hurricane lan were distributed to D6960 to help them in their continued effort to help the folks of Ft. Myers and the barrier islands of Charlotte county. (\$3,079.35.)

Also, as a small reminder, we also collected and distributed \$21,000 in disaster relief for Puerto Rico in November. Thank you so much for all you do!! Rotarians are such a strong and dedicated group of caring people that do so much good in the world. This is how people are helped after a storm. You can call the Red Cross or FEMA but the ones who make a difference are right here, identifying and helping those who are in real need. Total distributions in the 2022 storm season were \$57,529.

 Grant that sent 4 desperately needed generators to hospitals in Ukraine so
 they could continue to treat the injured.
- We dedicate ourselves to addressing the underlying causes of conflict by relieving millions of people suffering from poverty, inequality, ethnic tensions, lack of access to education and unequal distribution of resources. Our District participates in projects that build houses and libraries and provides surgeries to children born with clef palates.




• We train adults and young leaders to prevent and mediate conflict through our Rotary Peace Fellowship Program.

Many of our District Interact students have opportunities to learn about the importance of Peacekeeping and how

conflict resolution can change the future in our communities.
