Have you ever wondered what binds us together as a 1.4 million-strong global family of Rotarians?

It's pertinent to cite the view of R.I. President (2024-25) Stephanie Urchick as an answer to this rhetorical question. "Believe in the magic of Rotary. Spread the magic of Potary. Ruild on the magic of Potary. Celebrate the magic of Potary.



The Rotary International (R.I.) Presidential theme of "The Magic of Rotary†for 2024-25 is a mantra that taps on your own unique talent and set of skills to make the

impossible possible and to make that leap of faith in whichever way it empowers you to act on the timeless mission of "Service above Self.†â€œThe Magic of Rotary†is a powerful tool for us to muster all the attributes and abilities that are characteristic of our calling as Rotarians, in order to instill in our projects the wonder and joy of making a difference in the lives of communities that we serve. The "Magic of Rotary,†in the view of our R.I. President, is not a magic wand that we can wave to make the world a better place to live in for those who are on the margins of society. As we celebrate the "Maternal and Child Health†month in July, let's take a look at the impact of R.I. and the Rotary Foundation programs that provide access to quality care, education and resources for immunization, birth kits, mobile health clinics, awareness for prevention of mother-to-infant HIV transmission, and ways of breastfeeding to promote maternal and child health around the world. Around 5.9 million children under the age of 5 die each year due to malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor sanitation. Rotary programs that help mothers to take charge of their own maternal and infant health care range from Mobile parental clinics, Cancer screening units, and programs that help in preventing injuries and death of mothers and infants. Rotary members have launched a \$3 million, 5-year pilot to "restore dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers†in Nigeria. {https://www.rotary.org/en/our-causes/saving-mothers-and-children} Rotary programs provide life-saving equipment to the neonatal units in hospitals around the world, provide therapy to children affected by the psychological wounds of war in Poland, and provide women and children access to skilled health care personnel and telemedicine services in rural Nigeria. D6910 Governor Bobby Hildreth implores all our clubs to make efforts to work on projects that will "help vulnerable mothers and children stay longer and grow stronger†{https://www.rotary.org/en/our-programs} as we all work together on the R.I. Presidential theme of the "Magic of Rotary.†Amen.

Any time we think about the Youth Services, the following words of H. Jackson Brown, Jr. come to my mind, "Twenty years from now you will be more disappointed by the things that you didn't do than by the ones you did do, so throw off your bowlines, sail away from the safe harbor, catch the trade winds in your sails. Explore, Dream, Discover.†This quote, in our view, sums up the ethos of Youth Services in Rotary.

As we celebrate the Youth Services Month in Rotary in May every year, it gives us reason to celebrate the "Basic Education and Literacy†projects being done in our District 6910 and around the world, all of which are doing justice to the following mission statement on https://www.rotary.org/en/our-programs/youth-programs, "Rotary believes in developing the next generation of leaders. Our programs help younger leaders build leadership skills, expand education, and learn the value of service.â€



Every time we explore the programs being done by way of Youth Services, we are left in awe of the stellar community service and leadership programs being done by clubs around the world and in my home district, in alignment with Early Act, Interact, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, Youth Services Exchange, Georgia Rotary Student Program, and many more programs. Rotary clubs around the world supported the activities of youth as early as the 1920s by sponsoring Boy Scout troops and encouraging young people to promote civic values, health and hygiene, education, and vocational training. By the 1950s, Rotary International was discussing ways of engaging young people in community service and helping them create avenues for expanding their world views. These conversations gave birth to the creation of Rotaract and Interact clubs.

Rotaract is now an independent entity, but it continues to function as a role model for Interact clubs to emulate. Early Act and Interact clubs around the world organize at least two projects every year, one that helps their school or community and another one that promotes international understanding. The Interact club, an arm of Rotary International that comprises of the high school students in the age group of 12-18 across the world who are seeking to impact their communities with their creative energy, their treasure trove of talent, their passionate desire to serve humanity, their leadership skills, and their inimitable spirit of enterprise. At present, there are 14,911 Interact clubs around the world, comprising of 342,953 Interactors in 145 countries around the world.

The Canton Rotary Club was chartered in 1937. We have also sponsored five other Rotary Clubs formed in the area (Woodstock, Jasper, Towne Lake, Cherokee County, and Carpe Diem). As a club peopled by eminent educators and teachers, Canton Rotarians believe in the acumen of individuals to serve, whether old or young, near or far. Our club realizes that in a technology-driven world, more and more must be done to aid our schools and parents, not only to increase literacy, but also to aid teachers in any way possible to increase their time for working with children to build literacy. In view of the fact that no matter what the assistance is, any additional help in a variety of community and content areas helps improve literacy in a variety of ways. For example, writing improves reading and as students work to express their thoughts and feelings and share them through journaling, they increase vocabulary. This is particularly important for students who are learning English. Rotarians serving as Journal Buddies (funded by a Rotary District Grant) are also building lasting relationships and teaching young people to interact with adults in ways that may be different from what they are used to at home.





Six local students received \$1,000 scholarships from the Rotary Club of Canton.

This year, one of the culminating services of our club is to present six \$1,000 scholarships to local students. While we are blessed to live in a state with 34 public colleges and universities and 22 technical colleges, tuition is free with an A or B average under the HOPE Scholarship. However, this does not cover a myriad of fees

from athletics to parking, which, in some schools around the country, equals the price of tuition. So, our funds are well spent on aiding students to be able to participate in further education. In one such program called Book Buddies, Rotarians read books together with teachers, assisting with phonemic awareness, context and comprehension skills.

The Rotary Club of Canton also assists the Cherokee County elementary schools with Book Fairs, helping children select books in grade appropriate areas of interest, particularly in Title I schools, where parents are at work and cannot participate. We participate in a wide variety of ways with the Georgia Laws of Life Program that is unique to our state. This program offers opportunities to high school students across Georgia to participate in essay writing that enables them to reflect on their core values, and awards students with certificates and financial awards, while recognizing teachers with teacher and student appreciation events. And, we do fan out across the county for Read Across America Day!!! After a tragic earthquake in Turkey, the club sent many books there to be distributed by Rotary Clubs.

The Rotary Club of Canton is peopled by eminent educators, scientists, education professionals, and school board members, all of whom help and support the literacy initiatives in eclectic ways. With the prevalence of STEM schools in Cherokee County, the Canton Rotary Club has funded a Hydroponics Lab for an elementary school, where we grow flowers and plants for a STEM program, emphasizing farm-to-table lessons where students grow vegetables for school lunches. We also sponsor the Robotics team at a local high school to assist with materials for building prosthetics and shipping them to other countries, which helps students advance their learning on the high school level in complex areas of science. In the Canton Club's efforts to be inclusive, a Sensory Lab for Autistic Children enhances their abilities to learn as well.

In view of the fact that an average of 47% of students who begin higher education do not finish a degree within 6 years, the Canton Rotary Club assists in Career and Technical programs and organizes site visits to school programs in Cherokee County for programs in avionics and cybersecurity. All of this can lead to a wide variety of careers in the field of Air Traffic Control and the building of drones for the growing film industry in Georgia. When students participate in any of 40 career pathways, they are learning the language and vocabulary of diverse disciplines, ranging from health care to teaching to preparing for fire and police certification. The prospect of students graduating in any of the state licensed programs further enhances the productivity of the state. Probably one of our favorite programs is the extensive history of sponsoring the Georgia Will Watt program that funds tuition for students from around the world to attend a college in the area and become a part of our Rotary family.

Our most successful GRSP (Georgia Rotary Student Program) student came from Mazatlan, Mexico and fell in love with America. He finished his college education and became a member of the Club and is now serving â€" 20 years later â€" as our Rotary Club President, while working with our Youth Services chair and all the members of our club, on a range of Literacy Initiatives. Education, they say, is the most critical tool for empowering our "new generations†in Rotary. It fills our hearts with joy and gratitude to appreciate the stellar projects being done by clubs in District 6910 and the Rotary Club of Canton by way of our Literacy Initiatives, all of which will go a long way in promoting the expansive goals of education, literacy, and reading readiness across the district.
